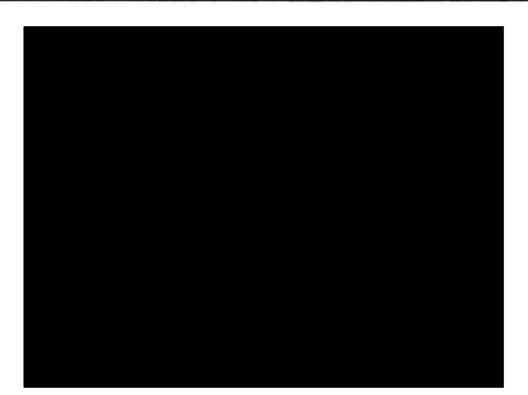

Structure: Governance and Management

Governing Document

The Church is administered in accordance with the terms of a Unitary Constitution

Recruitment and Appointment of Trustees

Members of the Kirk Session are the charity trustees. The Kirk Session members are the Elders of the church and are chosen from the members of the Communion Roll who are considered to have appropriate gifts and skills.

Organisational Structure

The Kirk Session, responsible for the temporal affairs of the congregation, is chaired by the Minister and meets regularly - at least five times per year. The Kirk Session consists of 3 sub-groups, Finance, Property/Fabric and Social Fundraising

Objectives and Activities

The Church of Scotland is Trinitarian in doctrine. Reformed in tradition and Presbyterian in polity. It exists to glorify God and to work for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom throughout the world. As the national Church it acknowledges a distinctive call and duty to bring ordinances of religion to the people of every Parish of Scotland through a territorial ministry. It co-operates with other Churches in various ecumenical bodies in Scotland and beyond. The Parish Church of Mortlach & Cabrach is a union of no less than five congregations covering a very large geographical parish. There is now only one regular place of worship with the morning service conducted there weekly with additional special services at appropriate times during the year including Easter, Remembrance Sunday and Christmas. In addition, an annual service is held at Cabrach Church. Our Minister visits local Stephen Cottage Hospital and serves the hospital in conjunction with the hospital's own chaplain. Our Minister along with the Aberlour church Minister jointly support the Speyside care home in Aberlour on a regular basis. The Church Guild meet monthly using the Guild Theme as guideline for meetings. They are currently trying to attract new members.

Achievements and Performance

We continue to welcome worshipers, and are pleased to see newcomers in amongst the regulars in the pews, with some new members also joining the Communion Roll. 4 new elders have been ordained, and we have welcomed elders from other parishes who have relocated to our area. We serve teas and coffees at the end of each service, which is a good opportunity to spend time in each other's company. We livestream the services on social media, and recordings are available to watch at any time.

There is a regular reading rota, and elders also rotate car share and door welcome duties as well as carry out regular duties associated with these roles. We have a core group of elders that are able to step in to take the services if needed.

Last year during the cold months we set up a weekly warm space offering warmth and food to anyone who wished it. This "Midweek Mix" proved to be a space not just offering food and warmth, but a friendly space where people could come to relieve feelings of loneliness, and so we have extended this throughout the year and hope to continue it in the longer term.

A fortnightly Praise Group has been established under the guidance of one of the elders who is a music teacher. People from the community are able to come along to learn new songs and practice old ones, and have performed at various occasions, as well as boosting the weekly worship in church.

A monthly Messy Church has been started in the local community centre, with a number of elders and other volunteers coming together to provide a welcoming space for families to come along and have fun doing some activities, spend time together worshiping and developing friendships whilst sharing a light lunch together.

Working with a local community group we arranged an annual Easter Treasure Hunt which provided a fun activity involving the solving of clues to lead you along the trail and win prizes. This enabled us to engage in a positive way with the community, and build relationships with individuals and community businesses, and we were able to include the Church building as a point along the trail.

We welcomed the local schools and nurseries to the Church for a special Christmas service in collaboration with the local Scottish Episcopal Church. The children took part in a number of activities including a nativity play, and the church was filled with parents, grandparents and the wider community during this special event. The minister continues to attend assemblies to talk to the children at the local primary school so is a well-known face.

The Church Guild continue to meet with a regular attendance of 10 members, and have hosted a number of successful meetings including The Big Sing.

The minister continues to hold alternate weekly services at the care home, and monthly services at the local sheltered housing.

Financial Review

The main source of income is the weekly offering scheme as well as donations under the Gift Aid Scheme. We also have a large number of members contributing their Offering by way of regular standing orders. The Small Gift Aid donation scheme also helps with our annual income. We also have an annual Christmas Appeal and this is well supported by members especially those who cannot attend regularly. Restricted and unrestricted funds are noted on our balances on The Statement of Balances - our page 7

Reserves Policy

It is the Trustees policy to hold liquid reserves for approximately three months estimated running costs expenditure appx £10,000 and we hold reserves invested in Edinburgh.

Statement of Trustees Responsibilities

The members of the Kirk Session must prepare financial statements which give sufficient detail to enable an appreciation of the transactions of the Church during the financial year. The members of the Kirk Session are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which on request, must reflect the financial position of the Church at that time. This must be done to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities and Trustee investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations, 2006 and the Regulations Anent Congregational Finance approved by the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland 2007. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Church and must take responsible steps for the prevention and or detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of Mortlach & Cabrach Church

I report on the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31st December 2023 which are set out on the attached pages.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner.

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006.

The charity trustees consider that the audit requirement of Regulation 10(1) (d) of the Accounts Regulations does not apply. It is my responsibility to examine the accounts as required under section 44(1) (c) of the Act and to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of independent examiner's statement

An examination is carried out in accordance with Regulation 11 of the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeks explanations from the trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the view given by the accounts.
