### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

#### **Governing Document**

The Charity is a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (a SCIO). It was registered in its current legal form on 6th February 2020. The charity was previously a company limited by guarantee, but changed its legal form by converting to a SCIO. Our governing document is our constitution revised upon change to a SCIO. It covers, type of organisation, numbers and appointment of trustees and members, policy and decision-making procedures, meetings and procedures related to running the charity in accordance with

# Recruitment and Appointment of Trustees

Trustees are appointed by way of nomination by the existing trustees.

### Trustees Induction and Training

The Board advises new trustees of their main roles, duties and responsibilities as well as advising on background information on the charity.

#### Risk Management

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed , and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

There are three trustees, supported by six addition volunteer members and three, part time, paid youth workers.

#### Achievements and Performance

The Bothie -Youth Work Performance:

The Bothie continues with Youth sessions Monday afternoon for P5-P7, Young and Free to Speak (YAFTS) S1-S3 on Tuesday evenings and Thursday sessions attended by S3+ years, all enjoying good attendance.

Part time Youth staff remain Rachel Lewis, Fraser Gray and Emma McPherson, supported by volunteers, Emma Forman and Dorothy Fraser.

Our ongoing partnerships with the Council and local businesses have continued to helped with the funding, and we thank Aberdeenshire Council and the Kintore Co-Op for their ongoing support.

In the last year, we have received funding from Thriving Minds (£15,000), Aberdeenshire Council (£12,533), St James Partnership (£2,000), Co-Op (£1,914), Muir Mohr Offshore Wind (£1,000) plus the Guides, Midmill School and local corporate, groups and persons (£2,063). Totalling £34,560 which is a significant sum, enabling the ongoing provision of "free to all" youth activities and services.

The Bothie Building: The Bothie refurbishment began in July 2023, the building work was contracted to Ron Grantwith material donations and support from many local businesses: Malcolm Allan Housebuilders, Scotia Homes, Breedon, Garioch Plant Hire, Rembrand Timber, Herras, Monarch Developments, Kingspan with materials donated by Glidevale, Astroflame. Local company CRC Evans provided labouring in handing materilas and removal of the bales. With hardfacing, soffit repairs and some guttering repairs and painting we will soon have the work completed, providing a long standing maintenance free building going forward.

#### Town House Project

'-Having received building modifications and change of use planning approval, we applied and received grant funding from the Architectural Heritage Fund to support the detailed building design for building warrant. We also applied and were successful in receiving a capital sums grant award from the Place Based Improvement Project and applied to the Special Projects Fund for further capital sums, but were declined on the basis of an out of date feasibility study and requiring a more detailed business plan. As this meant we could not finalise a lease agreement with the council and proceed with the work utilising the PBIP funding, we declined the PBIP award and applied and were awarded a grant from SPF to prepare a more up to date feasibility report. Upon completion of the feasibility report and updated business plan we can progress the lease with Aberdeenshire Council. The only funds we received for the project during our financial year was £1,075 from Leylodge Renewables Community Benefit.

#### **TRUSTEES REPORT (3 OF 3)**

#### **Basis for Preparing these Accounts**

The accounts (financial statements) have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities published on 16th July 2014, the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (FRSSE), the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended)

The accounts have been prepared on an accrual basis, under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant note(s) to these accounts.

#### Financial Review

The charity had cash in hand of £ 20,848 at the end of the year (2023 - £ 23,615). The £ 2,767 decrease has come a higher level of Bothie related income at £38,868 (2023 - £ 23,728) principally from grants and donations being more than offset by the cost of replacing the Bothie walls of £ 17,493 (2023 - £ 1,593).

#### Reserves Policy

The Trustees are of the opinion that the present level of reserves and committed funding sufficient to meet is sufficient to meet the running of the Bothie for the forseeable future. The reserve policy is to maintain a level and inflow of funds to permit this.

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the Trust's ability to continue as a going concern.

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### **Basis of accounting**

The accounts (financial statements)have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities published on 16thJuly 2014,the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities(FRSSE), the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended)

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant note(s) to these accounts. The charity has changed its accounting policy to an accruals basis, and that the prior years figures have been restated as a result.

#### **Funds**

Unrestricted funds are incoming resources receivable for the objects of the charity but with no specific purpose attached other than they are available for general purposes.

Restricted funds are those funds where the donor has placed a restriction and expenditure charged to such funds meet the criteria. The company has restricted funds and received several restricted funds with details amounts as in Note 2.

#### Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are measured at cost less accumulative depreciationand any accumulative impairment losses. Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets, other than freehold land, at rates calculated to write off the cost, less estimated residual value, of each asset overits expected useful, as follows:
