Our Aims and Objectives

We are incredibly proud to share with you the annual report for GamFam for the year ended 31 October 2025.

Who are GamFam

GamFam was incorporated on 11 October 2019 and was awarded full charity status by the Charities Commission for England and Wales on 3 September 2020 and the Office of the Scottish Regulator (OSCR) on 2 March 2022.

GamFam provide structured, lived experience-led online Peer Support for both affected others and those directly in recovery.

GamFam have now delivered 3200+ online structured Peer Support meetings and currently have 350+ members accessing regular support across the various 28 (with plans for more) weekly groups that we operate.

All meetings are underpinned by the **GamFam Recovery and Support Programme (GRASP)**, a structured framework supporting both affected others and individuals directly in recovery.

All of our facilitators have previously accessed support with GamFam and have completed our CPD accredited facilitator training programme.

Our meetings help our members start to understand the devastating impact that a gambling disorder can have. Through our collective lived experiences it offers guidance on how individuals, families and friends can help themselves, as well as practical suggestions for coping day-by-day and help move towards a more positive future.

In addition, members have the opportunity to share their experiences in a safe space, with no fear of judgement and with others who have real empathy and understanding with their own unique situation and perhaps offer that little bit of hope, especially in the very early stages of recovery.

For affected others, we run specialist groups tailored specifically for parents, partners, and a dedicated group for siblings, sons and daughters. On the recovery side, we provide meetings throughout the week, including a dedicated pathway for women in recovery.

In addition to our weekly groups, we host monthly joint sessions covering a range of topics alongside various guest speaker events. As well as our yearly in-person event we also hold an annual online recovery and celebration event.

This year we are also launching the **GamFam Roadshow**, bringing localised, in-person events to communities across England.

We firmly believe that the GamFam Peer Support and the evidence-based NHS therapeutic support are not mutually exclusive and that both services can complement one another. If we can support both the affected other and the person in recovery we think there is an improved opportunity for our members to maintain and sustain their respective recoveries.

Purposes and Aims

Our charity's purposes as set out in the objects contained in the company's memorandum of association are to benefit the public by the preservation and protection of good mental health and the relief of need among people who have developed or who are at risk of developing a gambling addiction, their parents, families and friends by:

- raising public awareness and understanding of the early warning signs commonly associated with the development of a gambling addiction to promote early intervention and minimise any related potential harms;
- providing advice and support in particular but not exclusively to the parents, family and friends of teenagers and young people at the risk of a gambling addiction;
- assisting and supporting individuals who have or may be at risk of a gambling addiction; and
- raising general awareness amongst the public of the issue of gambling addiction.

Our Vision

Empowering individuals and families to alleviate the impact of gambling harms and move towards a positive future.

Our Mission

To offer hope to anyone affected by gambling harms and the opportunity to share their experiences in a safe space, without fear of judgement with others who have genuine empathy and understanding.

How we achieve our Mission

- We provide advice and support to those directly and indirectly affected by gambling harms through structured peer support and signposting to relevant partners and agencies.
- By raising public awareness and understanding of the early warning signs commonly associated with the development of a gambling addiction we aim to promote early intervention and minimise any related potential harms.

Our Values

GamFam is an organisation that is committed to supporting any person directly or indirectly affected by gambling harms by:

- Ensuring **Lived Experience** of gambling harms is at the centre of everything we do;

- Providing a safe, supportive and inclusive service with **care** and respect;
- Carrying out our work to the highest of standards and with **integrity**; and
- Working with like-minded partners, organisations and our members in **partnership**.

Ensuring our work delivers our aims

We will review our aims, objectives and activities each year. The annual review helps us ensure our aims, objectives and activities remain focused on our stated purposes. We have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aim and objectives and in planning our future activities. In particular, the trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set.

The focus of our work

What have we done well

We have:

- increased the number of people accessing support through our GRA5P programme without compromising the quality of what we offer;
- consistently contacted all enquiries and referrals within 24 hours from initial contact
- we have held in excess of 3200+ online Peer Support meetings and have 350+ members accessing support with us on a regular basis
- carried out a quarterly survey of our active members through the Suffolk Mind Emotional Needs Audit
- completed a 3 monthly check in procedure for all non-active members
- developed a CPD accredited facilitator training programme to enable those with lived experience to train as paid, sessional facilitators
- designed a CPD accredited Gaming and Gambling Harms Information & Awareness workshop
- developed an accredited Key Stage 2 and key Stage 3 Gambling Harms Awareness workshop
- a committed and supportive board of Trustees
- written and developed a comprehensive set of policies and procedures
- evaluated our service provision with feedback from members.

How our activities deliver public benefit

Our Programmes

Peer Support

We offer support through GRA5P – The GamFam Recovery and Support Programme, a structured 5-stage self-help peer support programme which was originally designed to

support those affected by someone else's gambling. However, out of demand, GamFam have now developed a similar programme to support those directly in recovery too.

Currently all our meetings operate remotely via Zoom allowing us to help and support more people in more locations without any natural barriers to location. Meetings are hosted by trained GamFam facilitators.

The GRA5P programme delivers a strong support network so that group members can start to understand the devastating impact that a gambling disorder can have. It also offers guidance on how individuals, families and friends can help themselves, as well as practical suggestions for coping day-by-day and moving towards a more positive future.

Through structured peer support the GRA5P programme gives its members the opportunity to share their experiences in a safe space, with no fear of judgement and with others who have real empathy and understanding with their own unique situation.

What difference does GamFam make to our peer group members

GamFam offers affected others and gamblers in recovery a safe, confidential space to share and support with other peers. Our peer groups are structured around the GRA5P five step programme. All facilitators have lived experience of gambling harms and have attended our in-house training, safeguarding training and the Suffolk Mind's 'The Essentials' mental health training.

Feedback from our members

"Being able to relate to others who have had similar experiences. Listening and being heard, sharing and learning. But most of all having support and people who genuinely care."

"It has helped me to cope immensely with a member of family gambling on how to deal with the myriad of issues arising."

"It has provided me with a safe space to discuss issues related to gambling with people who understand what I am going through."

"It has given me the road back to life."

"It has given me huge support. A space in which to talk freely about my anxieties and from which to gain strategies to help me manage."

"If I didn't have GamFam, I would be seriously ill, both mentally and physically. I was totally unable to cope with my gambler."

"It's kept me mentally stable. Has given me hope that things can get better. It's shown me ways to put things in place to help prevent the gambler in our family from gambling."

"It's enabled me to process my own thoughts and think more clearly. For the first time in 2 years, I've started to talk about my life living with an addict/addict in recovery. It's like a weight has been lifted."

Information and Awareness

GamFam want to change people's perceptions about gambling and help combat the stigma surrounding gambling harms which is often referred to as the 'hidden addiction' so that gambling is viewed on the same level as other addictions such as drugs and alcohol.

Gambling is often promoted as 'a bit of fun' and has been normalised as an integral part of enjoying sport, in particular football. In addition, a recent report found that children who enjoyed the risk of simulated online gaming were more likely to gamble later in life.

Through our CPD accredited Information and Awareness programmes we want to support all people but with a particular focus on parents/carers, families and professionals working with young people to enable them to make informed choices and decisions about gambling.

The GamFam CPD accredited Information and Awareness presentations cover the following topics :

- The links between online gaming and gambling
- How gambling has changed and that potentially we all have access to a *casino in our pocket* through our mobile devices
- 10 Things to Look For & 10 Things to Do
- Preparing for 18
- Next Steps – additional support and signposting

Our presentations are age appropriate and can be delivered to parents/carers, families or professionals of children and youngsters of any age through to adults and offer strategies and advice for The Early Years (Key Stage 2, Key Stage 3) Preparing for 18 (Key Stage 4), Off to University/Work (Key Stage 5) and beyond.

Financial Review

The Charity is now firmly established, and our cost base has increased accordingly. The increased costs, combined with a drop in income, resulted in a deficit of £43,972 (2024: surplus £97,395). This deficit was comfortably met from reserves and we still retain sufficient reserves to support the sustainability of our activities.

Principal Funding Sources

During the year 9% of income was derived from grants and fees (2024: 41%), 86% from voluntary donations (2024: 56%) and 5% (2024: 3%) from interest receivable.

Reserves Policy

In The Trustees' view, the reserves should provide GamFam with adequate financial stability and the means for it to meet its charitable objectives for the foreseeable future.

The Trustees have adopted a policy of retaining sufficient free reserves to ensure the continuity of operations and to absorb periodic setbacks, while committing to the maximum amount available for the provision of services to our service-users.

The following formula for the calculation of free reserves was adopted by The Trustees:

- Six months operational expenditure (including cost of Services, Salaries & Overhead) multiplied by a contingency factor of 20%.

Less

- 75% of projected income over the same 6-month period

Reserves are to be retained in a combination of GamFam's bank current account, fixed term deposit accounts and an instant access deposit account. The allocation between accounts is determined by GamFam's liquidity requirements based on its financial projections.

The Trustees will review the amount of reserves that are required to fulfil GamFam's continuing obligations at a minimum of every six months. Care will be taken to consider changing funding structures and activity growth strategies. The policy will be reviewed at a minimum of every two years.

Investment Policy

Most of the charity's funds are to be spent in the short term so there are no funds for long term investment.

Plans for Future Periods

GamFam have worked hard to establish itself as a well-respected independent Charity. We currently support 350+ people on a regular basis and have held in excess of 3,200 online Peer Support sessions on our various GRA5P groups with a further proportion who do not access support on groups on a regular basis but are supported on an ad-hoc basis and are part of our quarterly check in routine.

We pride ourselves on being able to respond to all referrals and enquiries within 24 hours (if not sooner) and where appropriate currently have the facility to place those in need of support onto a group within one week.

Lived Experience is at the heart of everything we do, and we will continue to identify those group members who have the desire to become fully trained GamFam facilitators to enable us to increase the number of groups that we operate. We have developed our own in-house CPD accredited Facilitator Training programme that means we will be able to help more people in more locations without compromising the quality of our service.

Our plan is to adopt a co-facilitation model and use our established and experienced facilitators to work as mentors to support new facilitators in the early stages of their service. This will help us ensure that group members continue to receive the quality of support that they require.

We have a committed Core team that has allowed GamFam to take a more strategic approach beyond the day to day running of the organisation as it has grown.

We also have a dedicated team of Facilitators who have all previously accessed support with GamFam and have all completed our CPD accredited Facilitator Training Programme.

Structure, Governance and Management

Governing Document

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 11 October 2019 and was awarded full charity status by the Charities Commission for England and Wales on 3 September 2020 and the Office of the Scottish Regulator (OSCR) on 2 March 2022.

The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £1.

Recruitment and Appointment of Trustees

The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purposes of charity law. Under the requirements of the Memorandum and Articles of Association Trustees are elected to serve for a period of three years after which they must be re-elected at the next Annual General Meeting.

All Trustees give their time voluntarily and received no benefits from the charity. Any expenses reclaimed from the charity are set out in note 8 to the financial statements.

Trustee Induction and Training

The GamFam Trustees have worked diligently since the charity was established to ensure that our policies and procedures are robust and underpin the aims and values of the charity.

The GamFam Trustee Code of Conduct is fundamental to ensure that all trustees are fully aware of their responsibilities within their respective roles. As GamFam is a member of the National Council for Voluntary Organisations (NCVO), our trustees are encouraged to attend courses to help develop their skills in areas they would like to enhance and develop their knowledge and understanding to support the organisation.

In future the Trustees will be looking to increase numbers to further enhance the skill set to continue to support GamFam to grow and develop in line with its aims and objectives.

Risk Management

The Trustees have conducted a review of the major risks to which the charity is exposed. A risk register has been established and is updated at least annually. Where appropriate, systems or procedures have been established to mitigate the risks the charity faces. Procedures are in place to ensure compliance with health and safety of staff, volunteers and clients. These procedures are periodically reviewed to ensure that they continue to meet the needs of the charity.

Organisational Structure

A scheme of delegation is in place and day to day responsibility for the provision of the services rest with the Chief Executive Officer who is responsible for ensuring that the charity delivers the services specified and that key performance indicators are met.

Employee Information

As of 31 October 2025 and at the date of this report GamFam has two full time employees and four part time employees. GamFam engages with a number of facilitators, counsellors and peer support workers on a self-employed contract basis.

The Chief Executive Officer meets regularly with the Trustees to discuss strategy and priorities.

Responsibilities of the Directors

Company law requires the Directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of the affairs of the charitable company as at the balance sheet date and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including income and expenditure, for the financial year. In preparing those financial statements, the management committee should follow best practice and:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities Statement of Recommended Practice
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards and Statements of Recommended Practice have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is not appropriate to assume that the company will continue on that basis.

The Directors are responsible for maintaining proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. The Directors are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Report to the directors of GamFam ("the Company") on the financial statements for the year ended 31 October 2025

1. Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies are summarised below. The accounting policies have been applied consistently throughout the period.

(a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102), the Companies Act 2006 and The Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulation 2006 (as amended).

Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy or note.

(b) Public benefit entity

The charitable company meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS102.

(c) Going concern

The Trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charitable company's ability to continue as a going concern.

The Trustees do not consider that there are any sources of estimation or uncertainty at the reporting date that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next reporting period.

(d) Income

Income is included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the income have been met, and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Income received in advance of the provision of a specified service is deferred until the criteria for income recognition are met.

Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included in these accounts.

1. Accounting policies (continued)

(d) Income (continued)

Gift Aid receivable is included in income when there is a valid declaration from the donor. Any Gift Aid amount recovered on a donation is considered to be part of that gift and is treated as an addition to the same fund as the initial donation unless the donor or the terms of the appeal have specified otherwise.

(e) Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor or through the terms of an appeal.

(f) Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes irrecoverable VAT which is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

(g) Governance costs

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the professional fees and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity.

(h) Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are included at cost less depreciation and impairment. Depreciation has been computed to write off the cost of tangible fixed assets over their expected useful lives as follows:
