# Contents of the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2024

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Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2024

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2024. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### Objectives and aims

Our charity is the only dedicated project of its kind in Caithness, we offer a service to young children between the ages of 5 and 18 who, for one reason or another, have found themselves in a caring role in the home.

The key targets are to support Young Carers at and out-with school. To give them opportunities to reach their potential and help their families, to enable better support for the Young Carers.

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### Significant activities

Over the last year there has been significant changes in staffing within KLICS. Securing Funding enabled us to create and advertise new positions within the service. Our employee numbers raised to 10 over the year. We also have had a significant rise in referrals in all areas.

The demand for the service for supporting Young Carers has grown significantly.

Caithness KLICS is a child led service where the Young Carers get to have an input into how we run and what KLICS can do to help them and their families.

- Weekly activities are presented to the Young Carers where they get to chose the group session activity the following week, they are also encouraged to post in our "suggestion box" for any ideas they have.
- Our premises offer a safe space where young carers can have some time out from their caring role, a place to meet new friends and be a child again.
- KLICS ensures that opportunities like their peers are presented to Young Carers eg. Overnight trips, day trips, support from other local services.
- Young Carers have been made aware of the children's rights at KLICS KLICS arrange workshops to cover things like health and wellbeing, awareness of substance misuse, general hygiene tips.

Caithness KLICS help with the "cost of living" issues in Caithness where they secure funding to help their families with - food, electricity top up's, clothes, school uniforms.

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

Building trusting relationships with staff and making new friends through the groups, helps them realise they are not alone and there are others in the same boat as them. Small steps are taken so that confidence is not damaged at the first hurdle.

Many young people find it hard to engage socially and can display challenging behaviours when they first get involved, until relationships are formed with staff and peers. They find it exceedingly difficult to talk openly, until we gain their trust. They know that information that they share will be kept confidential, unless staff believe that that child could come to harm.

The young carer can relax and enjoy themselves for a short time during group, 1:1 or school visit activities, where they can have fun and be able to grow in confidence.

The definition of a young carer is, someone who looks after an older family member or siblings, a young carer might look after more than one person. There are numerous reasons why, a young person becomes a young carer, some of the reasons can be due to an illness, disability, mental health issue, alcohol, or drug abuse. Some of these conditions may cause the parent or guardian to be unable to care for themselves or anyone in the family.

Some of our young carers find themselves in the situation of caring for a sibling and a parent. Isolation is one of the biggest problems as it can result in carer not being able to see their friends and miss out on the social aspect growing up. They also find that they start missing out on school, skills, and activities because they must be at home. There are limited opportunities in the rural areas of Caithness, which means another lost link. All these lost opportunities can result in young carers' health and wellbeing becoming compromised, this can bring on low moods, self-esteem, self-harm, and lack of confidence.

A young carer may find it difficult to concentrate and/or relax because they are worried about their parents/siblings/guardian and what they might find when they get home. Some suffer with poor school attendance due to what is happening in their home life, which affects their own wellbeing.

Working closely with the young carers, raising awareness about what they do, gives teachers and people a better understanding of how a young carer's life can be affected. It also helps them to understand the bigger picture of a young carers' home life and the pressures they may have.

We have feedback forms/self-assessments forms we use to gauge how successful the project is doing; we like to gain feedback after each excursion.

This is done after respite breaks and trips. The forms help us to ensure that we are providing the correct respite breaks/trips for the young carers, that they felt comfortable and enjoyed their break, and allows us to improve events, if required. It also helps us gauge that the service is doing the best for the young carers. We get feedback from schools and other agencies that are involved with young carers and their families. This is useful to ensure all aspects of their health and wellbeing are getting attended to.

We run various weekly drop-in sessions at Wick and Thurso, rural schools, 1:1 visits and a parent drop-in.

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### Public benefit

We ensure that the Young Carers and their families have all the information and support they need. This will include making sure when the Young Carer has respite, the family knows that the help and support they need is in place. We also work closely with other agencies involved with the families lives, we help build relationships and create a good working partnership with the families and other services.

We review the family status every 6 months and involve the Young Carers in any discussions being made. This helps us build good relationships with families and empower them to build a better understanding of the young carer which will lead to a more stable relationship within the family unit.

Families are welcome and encouraged to come along and speak to us anytime with any concerns, if we are unable to help, we will give information for the appropriate services they may need.

We are also able to help families with secondhand clothes/ school uniforms & toiletries that have been donated to the centre. Due to COVID food parcels and Vouchers were supplied regularly. At Christmas we give donations of food hampers and toys to help the families.

We aim to see Young Carers become more confident and to be able to empower their own lives. Building trusting relationships with staff, making new friends through the groups, which helps them realise they are not alone and there are others in the same boat as them. Small steps at a time are taken so that confidence is not damaged at the first hurdle.

#### ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

#### Charitable activities

When we first moved in to the new premises in Macleod Road this offered security for the project and offers a saving from the previous rented premises of £9000 a year. This brings sustainability for the project and is very welcomed.

This has still not been handed over to KLICS but we are still in regular discussions with CVG regarding this. Hopeful for securing this asset by the end of 2024.

Seasons of Growth- Training delivered to three KLICS staff members in February 2024

Due to a shortage in Companions to deliver the Seasons for growth program we had to seek out new training for more staff. This was delivered in February 2024, with a Seasons of Growth session booked for October 2024 in Force of Nature - Lybster.

Young Carers Festival 2023

We took 4 Young Carers to the Young Carers Festival in Fordell Firs in Fife for 3 days in August. This was an opportunity to meet other young carers from all over Scotland and have fun. One young carer had never been outside Caithness so this was a great trip for them.

Highland Council - Service Agreement

In 2023 Caithness KLICS was recognized by the Highland Council and was offered a Service Level Agreement. This was a huge accomplishment and recognition for our hard work and dedication. This enables KLICS to also access funds from the Highland Council and gives a security for the future.

#### TRIPS- ACTIVITIES 2023-2024

Over the schools' holidays we had 43 sessions and reached 90 young carers including 15 rural young carers.

Some of our sessions included trips and workshops including trips to the Thurso Cinema, The North Coast 500 animal farm for the primary children, where they got to meet reindeer, alpacas, geckos, goats, rabbits, and snakes! Workshops included the Ormlie community gardens, Puffin Croft and some of our older young carers attended the young carers festival in Fife.

#### Thurso

Thurso referral numbers continue to rise.

We are still currently using Ormlie and Thurso High school base to run groups. Although we have been in talks with the Highland Council regarding a premises in Thurso, on a smaller scale than Wick, to have a base and hold groups. We have taken steps regrading this and are in talks with the Community Asset Transfer Team and changes to our SCIO are in progress to meet the CAT standards.

Rural School Support

Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2024

The Outreach Worker post has proven successful, and funding was secured for another 10 hour post in March 2024 to enable consistent support for rural schools. We support rural schools, during a lunch time, to offer 1:1 support for the young carer. This enables us to continue to build links with small, rural primary schools, alongside the larger town primary schools and both Wick and Thurso High Schools. Many of our referrals come from the schools or other agencies working alongside them. We regularly update the schools with the young carer's information, to log on SEEMIS.

Young Carers Awareness days- Rural school visits to Dunbeath Primary, Halkirk Primary, Watten Primary, Keiss and Thrumster, were carried out to spread the word about young carers.

We continue to raise the profile of young carers in Caithness, boosting awareness, through social media, local press, hosting & attending events, word-of-mouth, schools', and various agencies.

Funding grants have been received from various organizations to support the projects activities, staff salaries, rent, transport, local & away trips, and rest-bite. This helps us to maintain an excellent, reliable, friendly, and needed service.

#### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

#### Financial position

The net result for the year is a surplus of £2,264 on unrestricted funds (2023 - deficit of £6,258) and a deficit of £20,923 on restricted funds (2023 - surplus of £33,502). The deficit on restricted funds mostly represents grants received in the prior year being spent in the year under review.

At the year end the charity had unrestricted reserves of £31,203. Restricted funds stood at £65,524 and the breakdown of these is shown in the notes to the accounts. Restricted funds have to be spent in line with the stipulations of the grant funder and represent expenditure to be made in 2024/25, with the largest expense being salaries.

Cash at bank and in hand at the end of the financial year was £84,119 (2023 - £88,919) of which £64,381 is held in Restricted funds. £19,738 of the bank balance relates to unrestricted funds.

#### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

#### Principal funding sources

We are grateful for the funding received from Big Lottery Fund, The Robertson Trust, Foundation Scotland, Caithness and North Sutherland Fund and Highland Council along with other funding bodies.

#### Reserves policy

The reserves balance represent the unrestricted fund balance arising from current operations. The aim of the Charity is to hold unrestricted funds of about 3 months of the resources expended to cover the business-as-usual costs, which equates to about £46,000 in 2023/24. At this level, we would be able to continue the current activities of the Charity in the event of a significant reduction in funding, while allowing time to make alternative arrangements. At the year end, unrestricted funds equalled £31,203, however, there were still £65,524 of restricted funds to be used at that time.

#### **FUTURE PLANS**

We will continue to ensure that the young carers' families also have all the information and support they need. this will include making sure that when the young carer is on a respite break that the family has the help and support they may need.

We will work closely with all other agencies involved in the families lives, build relationships and share good practice with all our families.

We will review the family status every 6 months and involve the young carer in any decisions being made.

Working and building good relationships with the families will empower them to build better and more understanding of the young carers which will lead to more stable relationships within the family unit.

Families are welcome to come along and talk to us at any time with any concerns and if we are unable to help we will give information about the appropriate services they may need.

#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

#### **Governing document**

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust.

#### **Charity constitution**

On 20 February 2019 the charity converted from a company limited by guarantee to a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (SCIO), company number CS00384, administered and regulated by OSCR.

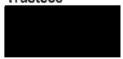

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

#### Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

#### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Plant and machinery - 25% on reducing balance

#### **Taxation**

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

#### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

#### Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charity's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
