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#### Trustees' Annual Report For the year ended 31 December 2024

The trustees present their annual report and financial statements of Camelon Parish Church, Church of Scotland (hereinafter referred to as Camelon Parish Church or the Church) for the year ended 31 December 2024. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the General Assembly Regulations for Congregational Finance, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended) and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland effective from 1 January 2019.

#### **Objectives and Activities**

The Church of Scotland is Trinitarian in doctrine, Reformed in tradition and Presbyterian in polity. It exists to glorify God and to work for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom throughout the world. As a national Church, it acknowledges a distinctive call and duty to bring the ordinances of religion to the people in every parish of Scotland through a territorial ministry. It co-operates with other Churches in various ecumenical bodies in Scotland and beyond.

Camelon Parish was formed as a result of a union in December 2003 of two local Churches (Camelon Irving and Camelon St John's) and is the legal inheritor of the assets and liabilities of these two former parishes. The Church continues to endeavour to reach people with the Gospel of Jesus Christ within the church and the community at large through a wide variety of events.

Regular worship takes place each week on Sunday mornings at 11.00am. During the summer months, (July and August) worship is less formal, with the objective of encouraging greater interactivity and active participation by the congregation. Whilst there is no permanent minister in post, the current Interim Moderator, Rev. Dr. Jean Gallacher, draws up a rota to cover the leading of worship within Camelon Parish. This rota consists of ordained ministers, those from the Readership, and suitably gualified Local Worship Leaders.

Forth Valley and Clydesdale Presbytery's Mission Plan was finalised during 2024. This plan recognised both the need to retain a physical worship centre within the parish, and that the congregation required a longer period to explore opportunities for greater collaboration with other local churches. Presbytery's solution was to allow Camelon Parish Church to apply for a Transitional Minister. Such posts are appointed for three-to-five years and are designed to help congregations identify their path to a sustainable future. Significant effort went into consulting with the congregation and the wider local community whilst preparing our application. This consultation process included developing a brief discussion guide for use with voluntary groups, Local Government and other stakeholders in an effort to better understand the current needs of the local community, as viewed by those working within it. This process helped to shape our thinking about how to best support our community and serve the Lord. The completed application form for a Transitional Minister was submitted on January 15th 2025.

Our recently established Guide, Brownie and Rainbow groups have continued to develop, with youngsters working towards the achievement of badges. They have also participated in services within the Church. The inclusion of such services has helped increase the number of young people regularly attending worship.

The Tuesday Fellowship continues to operate a varied schedule of events, which are well attended.

Our halls continue to be used on a regular basis by Falkirk Opera, Falkirk Philatelic club and the Freedom of Mind Community Choir. There have been enquiries from other community groups about using our halls, which we require to manage alongside plans for consolidation of our buildings.

Members of the congregation continue to donate many food items to the Falkirk Foodbank, of which we are a founding and partner Church, and several members and Elders take a leading part in the running of the Foodbank.

#### **Achievements and Performance**

With the reduction of Covid cases all worship is currently 'in person'. As an alternative for those unable to attend due to illness, immobility or concerns about proximity to others in confined spaces, we continue to live stream our Sunday worship. The provision of online services also offers a "catch up" option for those whose work or other commitments preclude physical attendance. We have also noted that some viewers replay the service even though they participated in person. The spiritual and wellbeing needs of the congregation and community remains a key focus of our church, although it can be challenging to resource a regular visiting schedule for all the vulnerable members in the congregation.

As no-permanent appointments to Camelon Parish Church's Ministry team were permitted during the Presbytery Planning process, and no suitable locum was available, worship throughout the year was conducted by a rota of individuals providing pulpit supply.

During the year,

a former Minister of Camelon Irving Parish Church, visited Camelon Parish Church in her capacity as Moderator of the Church of Scotland to meet with representatives from local churches within the Falkirk Area. This was a very successful and popular event, much enjoyed by the Moderator, her husband and other officials, and it generated an emotional response from many. The Moderator's itinerary finished with a visit to the Camelon Parish Charity Shop where she met many of the volunteers who operate it, plus other members of the Camelon community. The Moderator stated that this had been a real highlight for her.

It was with great joy that a special service was held on August 25th 2024 at Camelon Parish Church to welcome four new members to our congregation. One of the new communicants was also baptised. The service was followed by a welcoming lunch in the church hall.

The work of the Falkirk Foodbank continued throughout 2024, with volumes of both referrals and donations reaching record levels as the cost-of-living crisis generated additional demand, but also elicited a positive community response.

Whilst the activities of the congregation have yet to fully return to pre Covid-19 levels, the financial position continues to be supported by the operation of the Charity Shop, hall lets and rental income from our two manses. The Trustees are therefore satisfied that our reserves are sufficient to support the on-going work of the Church and we continue to meet all our contractual and charitable obligations as we look forward to a period of greater certainty and new mission focused activities.

#### Worship

Worship within the Church can be described as slightly non-traditional and a bit different from that which might be expected. We have no organist and use a digital hymnal to provide accompaniment for praise. We continue to make use of technology in worship through multi-media systems with words, images and themes being projected. This is now an established feature of our worship programme. The use of a higher quality projector continues to greatly enhance the viewing quality of the slides and video clips used.

Communion is celebrated four times a year, with the addition of the sacrament on the evening of Maundy Thursday and Easter Sunday. When ordained ministry is not available these events continue with an Agape Supper. Two services are regularly held on evenings during Holy Week, those being Maundy Thursday and Good Friday, when the norm is for a Tenebrae service to be held. Easter Sunday begins with a short early service in celebration of the Risen Christ, followed by a special Easter breakfast bridging the early morning service and the 11 o'clock family service.

Special services are also scheduled over the Advent period and Christmas, including a Bereavement service on the first Sunday in December, a family, nativity service on the fourth Sunday in advent, usually planned and performed by our youth organisations and children from the church. On Christmas Eve, a Watchnight service with a prelude of Carol singing takes place.

A service dedicated to our younger members was changed this year to include all our hall users to enhance inclusivity. This took place on the first Sunday of Advent, with each group (including Youth organisations) invited to decorate a window ledge within the church sanctuary, demonstrating their place within the church twinned with a Christmas theme. The event proved to be very popular and following this service the congregation and representatives of the groups were invited to remain afterwards for tea and coffee and to take time to peruse the windows, which remained on display till the end of December. Our younger members and their peers also greatly enjoyed a highly successful breakfast with Santa.

The Harvest Thanksgiving service once again proved to be both popular and practical. The congregation, which including our Guides, Brownies and Rainbows, donated 115kg of foodstuffs to the Falkirk Foodbank.

The Remembrance Day service took place within the church as always, with reverence to those lost during conflicts. As in previous years a representative of Camelon Parish Church was invited to lead worship at the War Memorial at Lock 16 in Camelon on the afternoon of Remembrance Sunday.

#### Community Charity Shop

The Camelon Parish Church Community Charity Shop continues to act as major link between the church and members of the local communities. Members of the local community continue to support this venture by both donations of merchandise and volunteering to help staff it. Pressure of demand from the local community for financial support continues to require formal, written requests for grants to be made. It is clear from community feedback that the charity shop has created a unique role for Camelon Parish church within the local community and continues to be greatly appreciated.

#### Church building programme

As a result of Forth Valley and Clydesdale Presbytery's Mission Plan, the Kirk Session was instructed to consider which of the congregation's current buildings would be retained as our future worship centre, and which would be disposed of. With the involvement of the Presbytery's Property Convener, the Kirk Session considered the merits and drawbacks of each building, their valuations, and the potential repairs and renovations required to make them fit for purpose. At the end of this process, it was agreed to dispose of the Dorrator Road Church and Hall and retain the Brown Street Hall.

#### Organisational development

The various aspects of church life are dealt with by three teams, each comprised of both Elders and Members of the congregation. They are Compliance; Church & Community; and Ministry. These teams are tasked with the work of integrating ideas and suggestions (gleaned from the 'Path of Renewal' project training) into church life and moving the church towards a more missional approach to ministry. It is both our hope and our intention that the additional stability and fresh perspectives provided by a new Minister will provide additional support for these groups, enabling and equipping each of them to achieve their objectives, and by doing so, ultimately reinvigorate church life.

# Principal risks and mitigation Among the principal risks that Camelon Parish church currently faces is the continued absence of a Minister. It has been almost five years since the took up his post in Kirkliston and almost seven since was called as Minister by Killearn Parish Church. This situation has been mitigated by two factors; the inspirational spiritual and practical leadership provided by our Interim Moderator, and the resolve of the Kirk Session, who have consistently and powerfully advocated the case for retaining a Church of Scotland presence in the community.

At the time of writing in March 2025, this key risk was furthered mitigated by news that whilst Camelon Parish Church's application for a Transitional Minister was unsuccessful due to high demand for the very limited number of suitably trained candidates, the Congregation has been granted leave to call a new Minister on a reviewable basis for seven years, subject to formal ratification by Presbytery on April 26th 2025.

#### Financial Review

Income and expenditure is set out in the Statement of Financial Activities (the SOFA) on page 9 and the accompanying notes to the accounts. The principal source of income is via Weekly Freewill Offering envelopes and Monthly Standing orders.

Total income increased in 2024 to £77,242 (2023: £70,760), of which income from grants and donations amounted to £26,667, around the same level as 2023 (£26,738 - see note 2 on page 12). Levels of regular giving and associated gift aid were broadly in line with the previous year. The church's community charity shop achieved gross takings of £22,013 in the year (2023: £23,000). Good use was made of Gift Aid, and tax reclaimed from HMRC equated to around 5% of total income.

Income from Hall Lets continued ro recover during the year, with an increase from £1,524 to £4,128. A full year's rental income from the Lionthorn Manse was supplemented by the letting out of the Cotland Road manse for most of the year.

Payments for Giving to Grow were £21,204 (2023: £21,690). Costs associated with the charity shop amounted to £10,459, including rent and utilities. There was an increase in overall expenditure to £69,196 (2023: £65,205).

The general fund had an operating deficit of £15,393 in the year before transfers. A transfer of £20,617 has been made from the charity shop fund to the general fund. The fund balance is £8,699 at the year end.

#### Reserves Policy

It is the Trustees' policy to hold reserves of approximately six months' expenditure including designated funds. At the year end the Church held free unrestricted funds of £107,042 (excluding fixed assets), which represents around 18 months' budgeted expenditure. £460,000 is held in designated capital funds in relation to property, as per Note 11. The Church also held £10,286 of restricted funds which have been provided for the purposes specified in Note 11. The trustees are satisfied with the level of reserves held.

#### Structure, Governance and Management

#### Governing Document

The Church is administered in accordance with the terms of the Deed of Constitution (Unitary Form).

#### Recruitment and Appointment of Trustees

Members of the Kirk Session are the charity trustees. The Kirk Session members are the elders of the church and are chosen from those members of the church who are considered to have the appropriate gifts and skills. When there is one in post, the minister is a member of the Kirk Session, being elected by the congregation and inducted by Presbytery in terms of the prevailing law and procedures of the Church of Scotland. During vacancy, Interim Moderators are put in place and also act as trustees during their term of appointment. Details of all those holding positions as trustees and other office bearers are on page 6.

#### Structure, Governance and Management (cont.)

#### Organisational Structure

The Kirk Session meets 6 times per year and is responsible for the oversight of all the affairs of the church both spiritual and secular. The Kirk Session is chaired by the moderator, who is the Minister or Interim Moderator. The work of the Kirk Session is remitted to the three Groups mentioned in the Organisational Development section above.

The Kirk Session calls additional meetings as necessary for the induction of new Elders, the introduction of new communicants to the Church and any other necessary business.

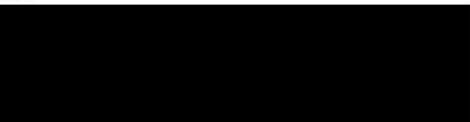

#### Trustees' Responsibilities in Relation to the Financial Statements

## Report of the Independent Examiner To the Trustees of Camelon Parish Church, Church of Scotland

I report on the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2024 which are set out on pages 9 to 19.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006.

The charity trustees consider that the audit requirement of Regulation 10(1) (a) to (c) of the Accounts Regulations does not apply. It is my responsibility to examine the accounts as required under section 44(1) (c) of the Act and to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of independent examiner's statement

## Notes to the Accounts For the Year Ended 31 December 2024

#### 1. Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies, which have been applied consistently in the current and preceding year in dealing with items which are considered material to the accounts, are set out below.

#### Basis of Preparation

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention, modified to reflect the inclusion of heritable property at market value, and in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standards applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) issued on 16 July 2014 and the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102), the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended).

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS102.

The accounts are prepared on the going concern basis. The trustees have considered whether there are any material uncertainties regarding the charity's ability to continue in operation for the foreseeable future, and are content that it is appropriate to report on this basis.

#### **Funds**

Funds are classified as either restricted funds or unrestricted funds, defined as follows:

**Restricted funds** are funds subject to specific requirements as to their use which may be declared by the donor or with their authority or created through legal processes, but still within the wider objects of the charity.

**Unrestricted funds** are expendable at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the objects of the charity. If parts of the unrestricted funds are earmarked at the discretion of the trustees for a particular purpose, they are designated as a separate fund. This designation has an administrative purpose only and does not legally restrict the trustees' discretion to apply the fund.

#### Income

All donations and gifts are included within income under either unrestricted or restricted funds according to the terms under which the donation is made and when the amount can be quantified with reasonable certainty. Donations and gifts in kind are brought into the accounts at their market value to the charity.

#### Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to the expenditure. All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis. The charity has opted not to report on the activity basis. Expenditure is instead reported by cost type.

#### Taxation

Camelon Parish Church is recognised as a charity for the purposes of applicable taxation legislation and is therefore not subject to taxation on its charitable activities. The charity is not registered for VAT and expenditure therefore includes irrecoverable input VAT where appropriate.

#### Tangible Fixed Assets and Depreciation

The charity has the right to occupy and use for its charitable objects a manse at Cotland Drive, vested in the Church of Scotland General Trustees. No consideration is payable for the use of this manse. Expenditure incurred on the repair and maintenance of this manse is charged as resources expended in the statement of financial activities in the period in which the liability arises.

#### 1. Accounting Policies (continued)

#### Tangible Fixed Assets and Depreciation (continued)

Tangible fixed assets costing in excess of £1,000 are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation, which is provided to write off the cost of the assets over their estimated useful lives as shown below:

Furniture & equipment	3 years
Fixtures & fittings (church)	10 years

#### Freehold Property

Freehold property is stated at cost, as amended to reflect current market valuation. Valuations are carried out every five years. Depreciation is provided on freehold property at 2% on cost, in order to write the assets down to their residual value over their estimated useful life. However, it is the view of the Trustees that the estimated residual value of the Lionthorn manse is not materially different from its cost or carrying value, and accordingly no depreciation has been charged on this property. Further, it is the view of the trustees that the value of the properties at Dorrator Road and Brown Street is in the main a reflection of the value of the underlying land. Therefore, in line with the requirements of FRS102, no depreciation is charged on these properties.

#### 6. Transactions with Trustees and Related Parties

During the year, the following transactions with trustees and connected persons took place:

- a trustee, was paid £1,900 (2023: £1,200) for providing pulpit supply;
- no payments were made to any other trustees or connected persons in the current or previous year;
- donations totalling £6,300 (2023: £6,400) were received from trustees during the year.

All Church of Scotland congregations contribute to the National Stipend Fund, which bears the cost of all ministers' stipends and employer's contributions for national insurance, pension and Housing & Loan Fund. Ministers' stipends are paid in accordance with the National Stipend Scale, which is related to years of service. For the year under review, the minimum stipend was £31,642 and the maximum stipend (in the 5th and subsequent years of service) was £38,884.

#### Purposes of Restricted Funds:

Donations to restricted funds are applied as noted below:

- (a) Flower fund: this is a fund to provide flowers for display during services of worship.
- (b) Baird Trust: this fund is available to be used for the relief of the poor of Camelon Parish at the discretion of the minister.

#### Purposes of Designated Funds:

Funds set aside by the trustees for specific purposes are detailed below:

- (c) Fabric Fund: The Trustees have set aside funds for the maintenance of the church property.
- (d) Charity Shop: The church operates a charity shop. Net proceeds from trading are available to support outreach into the local community, assist local community groups and for the general work of the church.
- (e) New Church Building Fund: This fund is to assist with the cost of building a new Church on the former St. John's Church site (as per Presbytery Plan).
- (f) Fund for Replacement of Office Equipment: The Trustees occasionally set aside funds to replace larger items of equipment.
- (g) Lionthorn Manse Capital Fund: This capital fund reflects the carrying value of the Lionthorn Manse.
- (h) Church Property Fund: This capital fund reflects the carrying value of the church properties at Dorrator Road and Brown Street.
- (i) Allsorts Fund: The Allsorts is the "Mothers and Toddlers" group and contributes to Church funds.
- (j) Tuesday Fellowship Fund: The Tuesday Fellowship hosts speakers and entertainers and has trips to the theatre and places of interest, and contributes to the Church.
- (k) M Logan Memorial Fund: This fund was established from a legacy, to be used to support young people taking part in church activities. Support is granted at the discretion of the minister.
- (I) Garden Fund: A small donation was designated for the purposes of establishing a community gardening project in the parish.
- (m) The fixed asset fund corresponds to the net book value of fixed assets other than heritable properties. Annual depreciation is charged to the fund and the cost of fixed assets purchased is transferred into the fund.

Transfers are made between funds to transfer contributions between designated funds, church organisations, the general fund and the charity shop.
