FIVE YEARS COMMUNITY OUTREACH IMPACT.

Introduction

This year's Annual Report is especially significant as we celebrate five years of service.

Five years ago, Chapel of His Glory (CHG) became a registered legal entity in the United Kingdom, with operational base in Glasgow City, Scotland. We were first registered on 14 May 2021, with a revised registration letter issued on 17 May 2021 to correct minor administrative errors.

CHG is a values-led Christian organisation committed to serving communities through compassion, inclusion and practical support. It delivers its community-focused initiatives through its charitable arm, CHG Refugees' Empowerment & Engagement Mission (CREEM).

Our formation coincided with one of the most challenging periods in recent history: the COVID-19 pandemic. From the outset, we recognised the urgent needs within our communities and sought to respond with compassion, practical support and hope.

As a faith-based organisation committed to sharing the Gospel of Jesus Christ, we believe that faith must be expressed through service. Responding to the needs of our neighbours has therefore been a natural outworking of our Christian calling.

Through CREEM, we have served more than 700 families over the past five years. Our programmes have supported immigrants, asylum seekers, refugees, people with irregular immigration status and ethnic minority communities across Scotland and beyond.

In the past five years, we have reached people across four continents: Africa, Asia, the Americas and Europe. Our beneficiaries

span all age groups, from infants under one year old to adults aged 60 and above, and 51 per cent are female.

We have helped families facing food insecurity through grocery voucher schemes and other forms of practical assistance. We have organised community events (e.g. Family Gatherings) that reduce social isolation and foster connection, signposted individuals to vital services and resources, and provided opportunities for skills development, education and employment.

A Renewed Identity

For the past five years, CREEM has represented CHG Refugees' Empowerment & Engagement Mission.

As our work has expanded, we have updated the meaning of the acronym to better reflect the breadth of our community impact activities. Going forward, CREEM will stand for **Community Renewal, Empowerment & Engagement Mission**.

Alongside this change, we have refreshed our logo to better reflect our mission, vision and the communities we serve.

While the name has evolved, our purpose remains unchanged: to empower individuals, strengthen communities and create opportunities for meaningful engagement.

As Community Renewal, Empowerment & Engagement Mission, CREEM remains committed to fostering resilience, promoting inclusion and building stronger, more connected communities for all.

Social Inclusion Programme (SIP)

The Social Inclusion Programme (SIP) is a community-based initiative that supports refugees, asylum seekers and displaced people to overcome social isolation and participate more fully in society. The programme focuses on improving language and communication skills, developing essential digital literacy and fostering social connections that promote well-being and integration.

The programme provides support through three interconnected areas:

1. Skills Development

Participants engage in regular sessions that combine language and communication development with basic digital skills training. The communication component is designed to move learners from basic conversational ability towards functional proficiency, supporting pathways into vocational training, further education and employment.

Digital skills sessions focus on building confidence in the use of everyday technology, accessing online services and navigating digital platforms that are essential for modern life.

2. Social Inclusion Activities

To reduce loneliness and encourage community integration, the programme provides regular social gatherings, including group discussions, cultural exchange events, shared meals and recreational outings.

These activities create safe and welcoming spaces where participants can build relationships, practice communication skills and connect with others from diverse backgrounds. Through these interactions, many participants develop friendships and a stronger sense of belonging within their communities.

3. Creative and Community Engagement

Participants are encouraged to share their experiences and express themselves through creative activities such as storytelling and community theatre.

These platforms promote confidence, cultural exchange and mutual understanding while giving participants a voice within the community. Through volunteering and active participation, some beneficiaries progress from receiving support to becoming contributors and leaders within their communities.

Through these combined activities, the programme aims to empower individuals to become more confident, connected and capable of navigating life in Scotland. Participants benefit from improved communication skills, increased digital competence, stronger social networks and greater access to opportunities in education and employment.

The Social Inclusion Programme is open to people of all backgrounds, cultures and beliefs. Grounded in the values of dignity, inclusion and community, it seeks to build bridges between newcomers and wider society, contributing to stronger, more cohesive and supportive communities for all.

Lives Changed Through Community Outreaches

While statistics help measure our reach, the true impact of our work is found in the lives of the people we serve. Behind every programme, voucher, gathering and training session are individuals and families whose stories reflect the power of community, compassion and hope.

Building Confidence and Independence

Elizabeth's Story

Elizabeth, originally from Latin America, was one of the members of the founding class of our empowerment programme on the north-west side of Glasgow.

Before joining the programme, she struggled with a lack of confidence in speaking English. She rarely went out because she feared that people would laugh at the way she spoke. Even attending medical appointments was stressful, as she depended on the presence of an interpreter to communicate with her GP.

Reflecting on her experience, Elizabeth said:

"Before I came to this class, I could not go out. I was ashamed that people would laugh at me and the way I spoke English. Even going to my GP was very difficult because an interpreter had to be there as well. All of that changed when I started attending classes here. Now, I go to my GP with confidence, knowing that it is just the two of us—there is no third party. That is very empowering for me."

For Elizabeth, learning English was about much more than language acquisition. It restored her confidence, independence and dignity, enabling her to participate more fully in everyday life.

Opening Doors Through Skills and Education

Ahmed's Story

Ahmed fled Sudan because of the civil war and eventually settled in Scotland. When he joined our programme, he had never used a computer before.

Although he had heard about computers and seen them, he had never had the opportunity to touch one or learn how to use one.

Through the programme, he was introduced to digital skills and quickly embraced the opportunity to learn.

In his own words, Ahmed said:

"Before today, I had heard of computers and seen them, but I had never touched one. But here I am, not only touching it but learning how to use it. Can we have class every day?"

Ahmed's excitement and enthusiasm were a powerful reminder that access to learning opportunities can be life-changing. What many take for granted represented, for him, the beginning of a new journey of confidence, inclusion and hope for the future.

Mr. Musah (name changed) joined one of our skills development programmes at a time when he was uncertain about his future. Through the guidance, training and encouragement he received, he gained the confidence and practical skills needed to pursue further education.

Today, Mr. Musah is enrolled in college and working towards his goals. He is not alone. Many participants in our skills programmes have gone on to pursue education, vocational training and employment opportunities that once seemed out of reach.

Creating Community and Belonging

Ms. Aminatu (name changed) came to one of our community events feeling isolated and without meaningful social connections. Like many newcomers, she struggled to find her place and lacked the support network that many take for granted.

Through relationships formed at our events and the encouragement she received, she found friendship, confidence and a renewed sense of purpose. What began as a single community gathering ultimately changed the trajectory of her life.

Ms. Sonja (name changed) first attended one of our events seeking connection and support. Inspired by the welcoming environment and the difference she saw being made in the community, she volunteered her time to help others.

Over time, her commitment, leadership and passion for service became evident. Today, she is transitioning from volunteer to staff member, using her experience to support and empower others. Her journey demonstrates how those who receive support can become powerful agents of change within their communities.

Providing Hope in Times of Crisis

The impact of our Voucher of Hope programme is reflected in the experience of Ms. SM (name changed) and her children.

After several years in the UK asylum system, the family was granted refugee status but faced new challenges during the transition from Home Office support to local authority assistance.

At one of our Family Gathering picnics, the family received a grocery voucher through our Voucher of Hope programme. What appeared to be a simple gesture became a lifeline during a period of uncertainty and hardship.

As Ms. SM shared:

"This voucher is like a cup of water in a dry desert—it literally saved our lives."

These stories represent only a few of the many lives touched through our work. Behind every programme, gathering, voucher and training session are individuals and families who are building brighter futures for themselves and their communities.

Strengthening Families and Communities

Our Voucher of Hope initiatives have not only supported families in need but have also strengthened local economies. Grocery vouchers distributed through our programmes have increased customer traffic for local businesses, including those owned and operated by members of minority communities.

Families who would otherwise be unable to afford recreational outings have been given opportunities to participate in picnics, family gatherings and community activities—without being asked about their faith, ethnicity, immigration status or country of origin. We believe that dignity, belonging and opportunity should be available to everyone.

Through our Family Gatherings and community events, we have created spaces where friendships are formed, cultures are celebrated and individuals who once felt isolated discover that they are part of a supportive community.

Growing Our Impact

Income increased fourfold year on year, enabling us to expand our programmes, reach more families and deepen our impact.

This growth enabled us to host more Family Gatherings and community events, with some attracting over 100 families—approximately 350 people.

While we celebrate these achievements, we remain mindful that many challenges persist. Rising living costs, social isolation, barriers to employment and the difficulties faced by refugees, asylum seekers and vulnerable families continue to require compassionate and practical responses.

Looking Ahead

As we enter our next chapter, we remain committed to serving marginalised and vulnerable individuals and families. We will continue to develop programmes that empower people, strengthen communities, reduce isolation and provide practical support where it is most needed.

Our vision remains unchanged: to demonstrate God's love through service, compassion and meaningful community engagement while helping people build brighter futures for themselves and their families.

Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of CHAPEL of HIS GLORY (CHG)

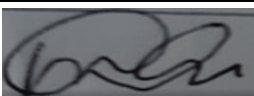
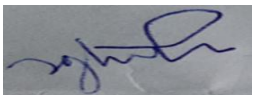

C1 Nature and purpose of funds *(may be stated on analysis of funds worksheets)*

Unrestricted funds are those which may be used at the discretion of the Management Committee in furtherance of the charity's objectives. The Management Committee maintains a single unrestricted fund to support the day-to-day running of the church.

Restricted funds are those which may only be used for specific purposes. Such restrictions arise from donor stipulations or where funds are raised for a particular purpose. Of the total receipts of £25,086, £13,475 relates to restricted funds. Expenditure of £9,980 was incurred from restricted funds, out of total expenditure of £17,021 during the year.

During the year, the church received £1,698 in donations towards its general activities. No fundraising events were undertaken..

Nature and purpose of funds

Unrestricted funds are those that may be used at the discretion of the management committee in furtherance of the objects of the charity. The management committee maintain a single unrestricted fund for the day-to-day running of the church.

The charity's unrestricted payments during the year can be grouped into the following categories:

- **Staff costs** – salaries paid to project staff, including temporary project officers and associates engaged in delivering the charity's activities.
- **Volunteer and service user expenses** – travel-related costs including mileage reimbursements, public transport, and other transport expenses incurred by volunteers, staff, and beneficiaries in connection with the charity's activities.
- **Premises and utilities** – costs associated with maintaining the charity's office, including rent, electricity, insurance, and related premises costs.
- **IT, communications and digital costs** – expenditure on telephone services, internet provision, website hosting and support, as well as the purchase, maintenance, and repair of IT equipment.
- **Office and administrative costs** – general administrative expenditure including stationery, printing materials, postage, and bank charges.
- **Professional and regulatory fees** – payments for external services such as accountancy, independent examination, and legal fees, together with compliance costs including Home Office/UKVI related charges.
- **Charitable activities and events** – direct costs of delivering the charity's programmes and events, including community outreach, family gatherings, venue-related costs, catering, and associated transport or equipment hire.
- **Grants and beneficiary support** – financial assistance and in-kind support provided to beneficiaries, including hardship vouchers and gift cards.
- **Other costs** – minor or incidental expenditure not falling within the above categories.
