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Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2025

Chairperson Report

I am happy to report that this, my first year as Chair of the Board, was a year of change for CHARTS, but also of significant growth.

stood down as Chair at the AGM in September, after leading the charity since its inception
in 2019 and her contribution to founding the CHARTS model remains enormously valued.
stood down in April, having considerably strengthened our financial planning and control
systems, and stood down representing Gaelic support. Councillor
was replaced as ex officio trustee by Councillor following a change in political control
at Argyll and Bute Council, and the Board continues to receive linked officer support from the council, through Senior Economic Development Officer, Transformational Projects and Regeneration.

The last AGM saw the appointment of four new trustees:
All four of them, bringing complementary strengths to the Board, have hit
the ground running and are helping to develop our culture of purposeful but supportive leadership.

Since its creation, CHARTS has attracted inward investment of nearly £1.5m into the cultural economy of Argyll and Bute. This year, projects have been supported by the Scottish Government, Bòrd na Gàidhlig, Foras na Gaeilge, Greenspace Scotland, Museums Galleries Scotland, Highlands and Islands Enterprise and the Art Fund. Academic relationships with the University of St Andrews and the University of Glasgow have also been strengthened. Most notably, in December, CHARTS was accepted by Creative Scotland as a candidate for its Multi- Year funding programme, expressly acknowledging the strategic importance of the organisation to Argyll and Bute.

Our work is made possible by the continued financial support of Argyll and Bute Council, which contributes to essential staff and delivery costs. Across recent years, we have strengthened our partnership with the council through taking over the management of the Argyll Collection, a notable group of artworks (including well-known Scottish and Ugandan artists) which forms a key educational resource to schools throughout Argyll. Additionally, through our partnership with liveArgyll that began in 2022, we have supported the care and development of the council's sole museum, located in Campbeltown. Through this partnership we also look forward to increasingly close working with Kilmartin Museum, supporting its responsibility to liveArgyll for the Campbeltown Museum archaeology collection.

The role of CHARTS, to develop specialist staff teams through securing external investment, has been fundamental to all successes, including that attributed to the Argyll Collection and the council having Campbeltown Museum upgraded in status to a fully accredited nationally Recognised Collection. Our work with members includes one-to-one and organisational support and we continue to create new opportunities and work in the region.

All this is made possible only through the determination and relentless hard work of our staff and freelancers, brilliantly led by our tireless Executive Director, Under her direction, we now have a five-year Business Plan which maps out our aspirations and ambitions for the next period.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The organisation's purposes are the advancement of arts, heritage and culture within Argyll and Bute through developing cultural and heritage practitioners and organisations by working cooperatively and in partnership with others; developing and utilising effective communication across geographic and sectoral boundaries; cooperatively growing our audiences and customers by marketing ourselves and others locally, nationally and internationally; developing and delivering partnership projects that will excite, educate and entertain our communities and our visitors; and accessing and sharing resources and training in order to bring culture and heritage to a wider audience.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Going Concern

Measures were taken to improve the financial position of the charity, which had been impacted by some projects exceeding original budget in the year and grants being paid later than expected. Successful funding bids in particular from Argyll and Bute Council (£75,000) and the Creative Scotland Development Fund, (£76,000) (25/26), have now assisted to improve prospects and the charity continues to seek funding for its programmes of activities and remains active in preparing bids. Robust financial procedures and processes have been put in place and the slim workforce has begun to be strengthened according to the new business plan (25/28), to ensure it achieves best value through achieving a high standard of efficiency, effectiveness and economy.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

CHARTs is a registered SCIO (SC049113). The charity is governed by its governing document, the Articles of Association.

Decision making

The CHARTS Board meets quarterly and more often if required. Several sub-groups are in place to support development of the charity. These include a financial and risk management sub-committee, a heritage sub-committee, project working groups and a Steering Group supporting members at local level. The Board is responsible for holding regular meetings, and generally controls the activities of the organisation; for example, the board is responsible for monitoring and controlling the financial position of the organisation.

Induction and training of new trustees

Trustees of the charity are appointed by majority vote after being proposed by another member of the Board. New board members go through an induction process where they are introduced to the staff, talk through the corporate systems and the role and responsibilities of the board are made clear.

Steering Group and member support

CHARTS is a membership organisation with over 600 members (individuals and organisations) Member support included via a Steering Group 24/25 and members at local level assisting with research and project development in both arts and heritage fields. The organisation's support includes to assist individual members and organisations to secure funding for their own initiatives, building cultural capacity across Argyll and Bute.

1. CHARITY INFORMATION

The charity is registered as a SCIO (Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation) and as a registered charity with Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator (OSCR).

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland'. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS102.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received, and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings, they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
