APPENDIX 1

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Achievements and performance

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the financial period

In our second year as a charity, Diversified has seen continued significant growth, extending support to 604 registered neurodivergent young people and their families. This year, the charity employed its first staff, which enabled us to increase the capacity of our services to accommodate more young people across West Lothian and surrounding areas.

Service Provision

Aspire, our wellbeing and alternative learning service, provided specialised support for 15 autistic young people aged 13 to 17, who were unable to attend school full time due to experiencing school trauma. Providing opportunities such as animal therapy, self defence classes, cooking and baking, outings, tutoring, mental health and wellbeing support, our Aspire service enabled young people to connect and make friendships, build confidence and take part in opportunities they were missing out on. Of the young people offered a placement in Aspire, 93% of them accessed the service long term and engaged in new learning experiences and saw an improvement in their mental health and wellbeing. Although not all young people's goals, approximately one quarter of those attending our Aspire service managed to re-engage with their education and increase their attendance in school.

Together Project, our autistic led youth club, supported a total of 45 autistic young people across the year. For many young people this was the first time they had been able to access and engage with a youth club, as it was specifically designed for autistic young people by autistic young people. Feedback from families showed us that it was not only a support for their young people but for parents and carers too. The group provided a safe space for young people and their families to meet like minded people and embrace who they are without judgement.

Our Small Group Tutoring, provided by our specialised neurodivergent tutor, enabled 16 neurodivergent young people aged 12 to 18 to access National 4 and National 5 maths and english tutoring support. This service not only supported young people's education, but enabled some of them to sit exams they thought they would not manage to sit.

Our Summer Holiday Club provided 66 activity sessions and days out across 6 weeks of the summer holiday, supporting up to 24 young people aged 10 to 18 years old per day. Some of the activities provided included crazy golf, sewing, bird house making, tie dye, slime making, outdoor water assault course, laser wars and baking. Many families expressed their relief that there were autistic led activities that were more accessible to their young people.

Throughout the year we arranged several events and activities for our autistic youth community including our Halloween and Xmas parties, trips to the theatre to see Wicked and Sister Act, outings to the EICA climbing arena, a visit to the National Museum of Scotland, online games nights and our parent/carer breakaway weekend, which provided much needed respite and support to parents and carers.

Our annual Christmas sensory pack donations provided £6,000 worth of sensory and fidget toys to 200 families with autistic young people across West Lothian and surrounding areas.

Partnership Working

Throughout the year we have worked alongside and made connections in our local and nationwide community to advance our mutual goals to support our autistic youth community. This included being a guest speaker at the Power of Difference conference held by West Lothian College, addressing hundreds of their staff team to provide autistic led insight to supporting neurodivergent young people. We also built a partnership with West Lothian Riding for the Disabled to provide accessible horse riding for autistic young people in our community across the summer period. We attended events to promote and provide support services in our community with other services such as Listen & Link and Carers of West Lothian. We also provided information sessions in schools to promote inclusivity and support for autistic young people. We partnered with Hey Girls to provide free sanitary products in our hub, Curiosity Collective to distribute wellbeing packs to young people, SWAN (Scottish Women's Autistic Network) to provide space in our hub to run their meetups for autistic women in West Lothian, Cash for Kids to provide £1,000 of sensory boxes to their Christmas appeal and Enquire to ensure young people with additional needs understand their rights in education. We were also part of Scotland's APO's (Autistic Persons Organisations) cross party group, to advocate for, address challenges and protect the rights of autistic young people in Scotland.

Funding, Fundraising & Sustainability

Although we are a rapidly growing charity with dependency on our services in our community, funding across the sector is challenging and competitive, bringing pressure to become more sustainable from our own income streams, primarily our sensory and fidget toy website. However, the cost of living crisis is also posing its own challenges on our income stream.

It is with great thanks to our supporters, funders, donators and community we have been able to provide the services that our autistic youth community needs. Great thanks to National Lottery - Awards For All, National Lottery - Young Start, Access All Arts Fund, Arnold Clark Community Fund, Asda Foundation - Better Start, Cash For Kids, Corra Foundation, John Watson Trust, Scottish Children's Lottery, UnLtd. Grow It, UnLtd. Selling Social, WLC Get Into Summer, and all others who have kindly supported, donated or raised funds for us throughout the year.

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER' REPORT

For the Year ended 31st March 2024

I report on the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31st March 2024

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees (who are also the directors of the company for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended). The charity trustees consider that the audit requirement of Regulation10(1) (a) to (c) of the 2006 Accounts Regulations does not apply. It is my responsibility to examine the accounts as required under section 44(1) (c) of the Act and to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of independent examiner's statement

My examination is carried out in accordance with Regulation 11 of the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts and seeks explanations from the trustees concerning such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the view given by the accounts.
