TRUSTEES' REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 2023

The Trustees present their annual report and financial statements for the year ended 30 September 2023.

The information set out the Legal and Administrative Information page forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements and the constitution of Dundee Dragons Wheelchair Sports Club.

Objectives and activities

The organisation's purposes are:

- To promote and provide facilities for amateur wheelchair sport in Dundee and community participation in the same;
- To offer coaching and competitive opportunities in wheelchair sport;
- To promote the Club within the local community and in wheelchair sport;
- To ensure duty of care to all members of the Club; and
- To provide all its services in a way that is fair to everyone.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED)

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 2023

Achievements and performance

Membership

This was a busy year of growth for the club. COVID had a particular impact on activities for disabled people and the return to full sporting & social engagement which began in 2022 has continued through 2023. There has also been expansion of the sports offering which has contributed to this progress.

Activities

The club supports regular sports activities including basketball, wheelchair rugby league (WRL) and badminton. Cycling has been a high growth sport this year & continues to expand participation aided by funding support. Other sports are also offered as "tasters" to provide opportunity to explore new activities for as many members as practicable. These have included sports such as archery, curling, and surfing. The objective is to offer diverse sporting experience and opportunity for members to progress in a chosen sport.

The club has provided wheelchair sports for a number of events across Dundee Including; Caird Park Community Sports Club Summer Camp and Elite Development Camp, SDS Tayside ParaSports Festival, School Events, NHS FITT Club Summer Camp, High School of Dundee Sports Day and other events.

Competition

Dragons Rugby League Team were crowned the first ever Scotland Rugby League Premiership Wheelchair Champions. Badminton playing members competed at a number of tournaments including the Discovery Games and PKDS Badminton Championships. Members have also won medals at Scottish, UK and European events this year. Junior basketball players are also progressing in the sport via National Academy Training. Club members have also represented Scotland in wheelchair basketball and attended GB team training camps.

Fundraising

Fundraising is vital to the club as it allows members to engage in activities with a minimal personal cost. This year was the club's 10th Anniversary, celebrated by Charity Ball and other events to celebrate the positive spirit & community that has been built up around the club.

We are also grateful for funding support from Bailey Gifford, Cycling UK and Energy Savings Trust who have contributed to the rapid expansion of our adaptive cycling fleet.

Awards

The club is regularly nominated for awards. This year Dragons have received a number of accolades including; Variety Club Disability Sports Awards Club of the Year (UK Wide), Dundee Sports Awards Club of the Year and British Cycling Limitless Focus Club 2023.

Dundee Dragons were shortlisted for Dundee Club of the Year, with members also nominated for Volunteer of the Year and for the Jenny Wood Allen Award at the Dundee Sports Awards.

Financial review

The results for the year are set out in the receipts and payments account.

Reserves policy

Trustees' policy is to retain a minimum of 3 months normal running costs in order to meet commitments and to cover any unexpected expenditure. This equates to around £4,505 (2023: £3,645) (excluding equipment purchases) and unrestricted reserves at the year end amount to £12,692 (2022: £11,260). The Trustees continue to look at fundraising activities for the future to increase the level of unrestricted funds.

Plans for future periods

The club has reestablished most pre-pandemic sporting & social activity and seeks to sustain the expansion of activities for members during the year ahead. Continued development of cycling activity is planned. It's hoped to resume regular tennis & curling during 2024 season. The club will also seek to offer new sports with the aid of external providers. Skiing is one objective carried from last year as it was not possible to fit into schedule due to snow conditions & availability of external providers.

Structure, governance and management

The Dundee Dragons Wheelchair Sports Club was incorporated on 29 September 2015 and registered with the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator as an SCIO (Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisaion) under charity number SC046015 on that date. The funds held by the previous unincorporated association, also called Dundee Dragons Wheelchair Sports Club, were transferred to the SCIO upon registration. Particulars of the trustees and professional advisors along with relevant addresses are shown on the Legal and Administrative page of the report.

The Trustees who served during the year and up to the date of signature of the financial statements were:



The maximum number of charity trustees is nine. Out of that, no more than five shall be members of the organisation and no more than four shall be non-members of the organisation.

The structure of the organisation consists of the members, who have powers to appoint those who will serve on the board and take decisions on changes to the constitution itself and the board, who generally control the activities of the organisation. The people serving on the board are referred to as charity trustees.

Statement of Trustees' responsibilities

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

The law applicable to charities in Scotland requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources of the charity for that year.

In preparing these financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping sufficient accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended) and the provisions of the trust deed. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.
