Structure Governance & Management

Legal status and founding document

Innerwick Parish Welfare Association (IPWA) is an unincorporated association. It is governed by its constitution and has charitable status.

Recruitment and appointment of Trustees

Trustees come from members of local organisations and residents.

Organisational Structure

The association is managed by a committee of up to 15 trustees who meet regularly. Election of office bearers occurs at the annual general meeting and during trustee meetings where changes need to be made before an AGM.

Objectives & Activities

Purpose and principal activities

The organisation's purposes are:

- to promote the welfare of those resident in the parish of Innerwick by the initiation, encouragement and support of activities of a charitable, cultural or recreational nature; and the maintenance of a meeting place or places for the furtherance of these needs.
- ii) to raise funds, receive and hold monies and other assets and to receive, hold and keep in good repair the property of the association all for the furtherance of these ends.

IPWA has good relations with East Lammermuir Community Council who lead the community response on issues around developments such as traffic management and biodiversity, and community benefit

attached to each development. There is considerable concern for safe routes for pedestrians and cyclists including a crossing over or under the A1 and details of HGV movements during works.

Achievements and review of the year continued

IPWA continued to be involved in community consultations and the Hall has hosted a number of community meetings to this end. Innerwick is at the centre of many planning applications relating to the electricity infrastructure of this part of Scotland. We face eight years or so of construction works and are likely to end up with a rash of battery electricity storage system. The parish is the landfall site for both the Berwick Bank wind farm and the proposed connector cable to England. The sub station at Branxton is being significantly enlarged.

Another local project independent of IPWA aiming to retrofit adequate insulation all properties in the village is progressing well and may become a pilot for other places around the country.

Building Development

During the year there was no further information as to the future of the Outdoor Field Study Centre; however, IPWA did arrange for a tour with a view to using this space for community events during the refurbishment of the hall. The Church of Scotland sold Innerwick Parish Church and planning permission has been granted for a private dwelling. The village hall continues to be the village's primary community space.

The restoration of the village hall has continued to be a major focus of the work of the trustees, who are diligently trying to carry out plans initially agreed by current and previous members of the committee.

There was a community survey where the local population voted to go for a refurbished hall rather than to demolish and rebuild from scratch. Groves Raines Architect Studios (GRAS) were appointed as architects for the restructuring which will provide for the general overhaul and insulation of the hall, a reheat kitchen, adequate and gender-neutral toilets and improved accessibility.

During 2022/3 planning permission was applied for, and subsequently granted, and the Trustees continue to liaise with the Architects to achieve the best end result for the community.

Publicity and events

- IPWA produced a bi-monthly newsletter. This A5 newsletter covers news, forthcoming events
 and general information. IPWA thanks Lothian Printers for their assistance and support in
 producing the newsletter.
- 2. Thanks also go to all those who distribute the newsletter to the 220 households in the parish.
- 3. The hall is the venue for a regular baby and toddlers group, when demand exists.
- 4. We have sadly lost our local satellite Post Office provider, but have been corresponding with government and local officials to try and have this reinstated.

- 5. The Hall continues to be used as a polling station and for various consultation events for proposed infrastructure developments in the area mentioned above.
- 6. In particular we would like to mention and thank and helpers for the monthly soup and pudding lunch which has proved very successful. Events like this are also very important in combatting isolation, strengthening community links and resilience, as well as enjoying the food and fellowship these afford.
- 7. There is a small library and book exchange.
- 8. The 150th Innerwick Horticultural Society Flower Show (which is separately organised but makes use of the hall and grounds) took place on the first Saturday in August, which was a historic and well-supported occasion.
- 9. The annual Hogmanay Dance made a return on New Year's Eve and was very well-supported, and we look forward to this annual tradition continuing.

Financial Review

Our ordinary finances are healthy, and IPWA SCIO is in the process of applying to East Lammermuir Community Council for Community Benefit Funding from Fred Olsen Renewables for the anticipated refurbishment costs. Our annual accounts are attached, noting again the ill health of two previous treasurers forcing them to step down at short notice. Grateful thanks to our current treasurer for his preparation of these accounts.

Reserves policy

The Trustees' policy is to maintain at least 2-3 months of normal running costs to meet commitments and cover any unexpected expenditure. Unrestricted reserves at 31 March 2024 stand at £8,103.

Plans for future year

The objectives of the charity in the coming year are to complete the transfer to Innerwick Parish Welfare Association SCIO, and seek consent to wind up.

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES OF INNERWICK PARISH WELFARE ASSOCIATION SCIO

I report on the financial statements of the SCIO for the YEAR ended 31 March 2024, which are set out on pages 5 and 6 and the related notes on pages 7.

Respective responsibilities of Trustees and Examiner

The charity's Trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 ("the 2005 Act") and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended) ("the 2006 Regulations"). It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts and seeks explanations from the Trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit and, consequently, I do not express an audit opinion on the view given by the accounts.

Funds continued

Unrestricted funds

The general funds are available to use under the direction of the Trustees to further the objects of the charity.

Restricted funds

Adapt & Thrive funding was received following the pandemic to allow charities to adapt and support covid recovery plans. The balance of this fund is for....

Building/SCIO development represents a fund which was received to architects feed through to planning permission of the hall. It was also agreed that it could be used for legal advice to for the new SCIO, The balance at the start pf the year of £3,743 has now been fully spent on survey, planning and legal fees.

New Building Phase 1 represents a fund which is ringfenced for building works for the new hall.

Social inclusion funding is for community inclusion. This is expected to be spent in the 2024-25 year.

Trees funding is to plant trees. This is expected to be spent in the 2024-25 year.

Transfers between funds

A transfer was made from unrestricted funds to contribute to the costs of the legal fees for the SCIO.
