Christmas campaign

MESSAGE FROM OUR PAST CHAIR

Ongoing work to tackle poverty

Kirkcaldy Foodbank played an active role in national discussions on reducing poverty.

The foodbank contributed evidence to the Child Poverty Taskforce, highlighting the local impact of poverty, and advocated for change. Meetings with senior government officials focused on partnership working, barriers to increasing household income and the need for improved mental health and housing support.

The subsequent decision by the UK Government to end the two-child benefit cap was a significant and important achievement.

It is really quite something that the work and opinions of our foodbank are held in such high regard.

Community and business support

Many local businesses have stepped up to assist with operational challenges. Following a freezer breakdown, Lovat's Group donated a brand-new replacement unit, while Iceland repaired another freezer and committed to ongoing maintenance. Community generosity has also been exceptional, with donations from schools, sports clubs, businesses and individuals.

Finally, thank you for allowing me to be chair for this period – it has been a rewarding and humbling experience.

OUR 2025 SUCCESSES

Our purpose is to address food poverty in the Kirkcaldy area, seeking to provide food to those in need, the advancement of citizenship and community development, and the relief of those in need. **So what did we do in 2025?**



DURING 2025 WE PROVIDED...



- More than 12,500 parcels – an average of 1056 every month.
- Nearly 8500 parcels for single people – an average of more than 700 every month.
- More than 2000 family-sized parcels – an average of 170 every month.
- Much-needed food to an average of more than 650 adults and nearly 250 children every week.
- Of the people who received food from us in 2025, 31% were children.
- Food to nearly 100 new people every month – who had not needed our help for at least 12 months (or possibly never).



There was a reduction in visits in 2025 – 18% fewer than in 2024. Some of that reduction is likely to be because of some changes we introduced in 2025 to target our help more effectively.

We do not know the reasons why people stop coming to us for food. However, we are hopeful that the support and advice being provided by our partner agencies is making a difference.

TARGETING OUR HELP

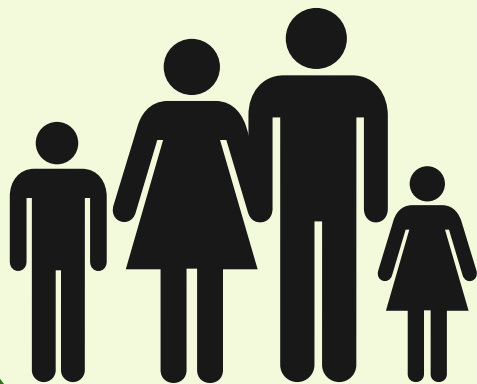


- We introduced a practice of asking our clients to show evidence of their address and the number of adults and children in their household. This enabled us to target our resources more effectively at the people who need it most.
- At the same time, we changed our approach to give out one larger parcel to clients rather than a smaller parcel and then extras if required later in the week. This reduced the number of weekly client visits.
- Our clients are happy with this initiative and commented on having more time to speak to us as the queues have shortened.
- Our volunteers now feel they can have longer, more meaningful conversations which helps with better signposting and general help and advice.



MORE THAN JUST FOOD

- We continue to work closely with our partners in Fife Council's Community Development Welfare Support Team. They are regularly based in our distribution centres, particularly in our main base at the Park Road Centre. This means that people coming to the foodbank can more readily access the help they need.
- Foodbank volunteers at New Volunteer House now have the opportunity to refer clients to Citizens Advice and Rights Fife (CARF) for drop-in advice to enable the client to make appointment with the correct professional within CARF.
- Kingdom Housing Association provided support in 2025 by offering clients advice on housing issues.



DIGNITY AND ACCESSIBILITY



- We have continued to allow people to self-refer when coming to the foodbank, and have not required them to obtain a referral from another agency. This reduces bureaucracy and barriers that can prevent people from accessing support, and enables us to provide a more dignified approach.
- We remain committed to enabling people to have as much choice of food as possible when they receive our support.



- We continue to provide fresh fruit and vegetables to those seeking our help. We also provide frozen ready-meals and other frozen food.
- We have supported our local economy by buying fruit and vegetables from local firms.

INFLUENCING POLICY



- At the invitation of the MP for Cowdenbeath and Kirkcaldy, Melanie Ward, our then chair Angela Campbell and fellow trustee Ian Campbell visited the House of Commons in March 2025 to contribute to the work of the Child Poverty Taskforce.
- They were able to present the reality of the impact of child poverty and the limitations this imposes on children and their families using the experience and knowledge gathered over the years of the foodbank's existence. They were also able to describe the impact of the joint work we have been undertaking with partners in the Kirkcaldy area.

- Chancellor Rachel Reeves subsequently announced in her Budget in November that the cap limiting households on universal or child tax credit from receiving payments for a third or subsequent child would be scrapped from April 2026.
- Melanie Ward thanked the foodbank for its input to the discussion.



CHRISTMAS CAMPAIGN

K107FM, Kirkcaldy's award-winning community radio station, and Love Oor Lang Toun launched a 'Christmas Collection' campaign in support of the foodbank. The focal point of the campaign was 'Lang Toun Lights' – the switch-on of the town's Christmas lights on Kirkcaldy High Street on Saturday, November 29.

People attending the day-long celebration, which included entertainment and a visit from Santa, were encouraged to bring donations of essential items to help those in need.

Several foodbank volunteers were in the town centre on the day to collect cash donations and uplift food.

Alex Airnes, from K107FM, said: "Local radio will often organise festive toy appeals, and we will actively see positive examples of this across the region. This year, we wanted to shine a light on the needs within our area and use the power of local radio to make a real difference."



Donations of cash and food poured in as the foodbank geared up for the festive period.

The campaign was backed by former Prime Minister and long-standing foodbank supporter, the Rt Hon Gordon Brown, as well as Kirkcaldy MP Melanie Ward.

Numerous individuals, schools, businesses and organisations rallied round to support the appeal.

REDUCING FOOD WASTE

- We work closely with FareShare who supply good quality surplus food from across the food industry. They provide us with both fresh and ambient food at an affordable price.
- We also prevent waste by taking surplus food from local stores including Co-op food stores, Baynes, Greggs and Stephens.



COMMUNITY SUPPORT

We're very grateful for the range of events that were held by members of the community this year for Kirkcaldy Foodbank.

- Kirkcaldy Acoustic Music Club held its annual New Year fundraising event at the Polish Club which raised an amazing £1,372.50.



- Members of Langtoun Central Church donated food and £330 in cash from their harvest service.
- Pupils and staff at Torbain Primary School collected an amazing amount of food to donate to the foodbank ahead of the October holiday.
- Pupils and staff at Dunnikier Primary School also organised a collection of food ahead of the October holiday.

COMMUNITY SUPPORT

- The staff of Outpatients 7 at Whyteman's Brae Hospital collected food and toiletries for Kirkcaldy Foodbank in the run-up to the festive season.



- Raith Rovers FC and their wonderful supporters held regular collections of food, toiletries and cash throughout the year.
- Fife Housing Group donated £1,250 as part of their Giving Something Back grant scheme.
- Kingdom Housing Association staff organised a charity challenge to see which team could collect the most items for the foodbank. As well as the large amount of food, KHA also made a cash donation of £500 through its Community Initiatives Fund.

COMMUNITY SUPPORT

- Our thanks go to the many local businesses who hold regular collections of food on our behalf. These donations are uplifted regularly by our volunteers from locations including Asda, B&M, Co-op, Lidl, M&S, Morrisons, Nationwide, Royal Bank of Scotland, Sainsbury's and Tesco.



- Lovat's Group kindly donated a new freezer after one of the freezers at the Park Road Centre broke down.



COMMUNITY SUPPORT

- Fife Flyers supporters generously donated a fantastic amount of food at the match against Coventry Blaze in December.



- Pupils at St Andrew's High School donated a large number of items just before Christmas.
- Viewforth High School held a "dress down day" on the last day of term before the Christmas holiday, and asked pupils to bring in donations to the foodbank in return – resulting in an amazing donation of more than 1000 items!
- Staff and customers at Arnold Clark Kirkcaldy Kia organised a Christmas collection to support the foodbank.

OTHER DEVELOPMENTS



- We have continued our close working relationship with Fife Council's Community Payback Team, who provide us with vital logistical support by transporting food parcels from the Park Road Centre to our other outlets in Kirkcaldy.
- We have remained active members of the Independent Food Aid Network (IFAN), contributing our data and experience to their work lobbying governments and highlighting food poverty in the media.

WHY ARE WE STILL NEEDED?

Kirkcaldy Foodbank has now been in existence for 12 years.

Although total visits to the foodbank fell by 18% in 2025, there were still an average of more than 1000 visits per month.

So why are we still so busy?

The [Local Strategic Assessment for the Kirkcaldy Area](#), produced by Fife Council Research and Insight Team and published in February 2025, makes for interesting reading.

- The report states that 23.6% of children in Fife are now living in relative poverty (in households with income less than 60% UK median income) compared to 21.3% for Scotland as a whole.
- The Kirkcaldy, Levenmouth, Glenrothes and Cowdenbeath areas all have higher child poverty rates than Fife as a whole.

- In central Kirkcaldy, 38.5% of children live in low income households.
- One-quarter of households in Kirkcaldy are categorised as Low Income Living, nearly double the proportion for Fife as a whole.
- Older people, those living alone, poor physical health, caring responsibilities, low education and poor English skills are particular drivers of poor financial resilience in the Kirkcaldy area.
- Kirkcaldy has the highest level of fuel poverty risk in Fife, based on ability to pay for fuel.
- The neighbourhoods with the poorest outcomes within the Kirkcaldy area are Gallatown, Sinclairtown, Hayfield, Smeaton, Templehall West and Dysart.

GEORGE WILCOCK

Former Kirkcaldy Foodbank board member, stock team lead and long-standing volunteer George Wilcock sadly died on February 2, 2026. Although George had been suffering from indifferent health, he remained an active member of the foodbank and his death came as a real shock to everyone.

George was involved with the foodbank from its early days. He joined the board in 2015 and became secretary in 2017, continuing in that role until 2023.

He also became lead for the stock team, working tirelessly behind the scenes to co-ordinate the ordering and delivery of stock to ensure we had the supplies needed to provide food parcels for our clients.

He was also heavily involved in our moves between premises, most recently the major upheaval of moving from Viewforth Parish Church hall to the Park Road Centre in 2024.

George is hugely missed by everyone. He was a stalwart of the foodbank and a friend to us all.

Our thoughts remain with George's wife Kath and their family, both in the UK and America.

WHAT OUR PARTNERS SAY

WHAT OUR PARTNERS SAY

When people don't know where else to turn, Kirkcaldy Foodbank is often their last resort. But when they're met with compassion and kindness, the stigma fades away, leaving them feeling relieved and supported.

Once people step inside and see it's a safe space, they can connect with welfare officers, who can guide them to other services such as a full financial and benefits check, as well as practical help such as access to the clothing bank, energy checks and support with energy and living costs.

We've always seen the foodbank as just one part of a bigger picture.

When we started the foodbank, we knew we couldn't do it alone. From the beginning, we teamed up with local churches, the mosque, supermarkets, Fife Council and other community services.

Working in partnership with the foodbank helps us take a more proactive and preventative approach.

By sharing information and resources, we can spot needs sooner.



Fife Council launched Cafe Inc, which offers children a free meal throughout the school holidays - a time that can be especially challenging for parents.

Having a joined-up approach with all partners enables us to address issues early, helping to avoid crisis points and the need to rely on the foodbank.

WHAT OUR PARTNERS SAY

Kirkcaldy Foodbank provides a lifeline for the local community.

Kirkcaldy still has high levels of relative child poverty, while 60% of working age adults living in poverty are in paid work.

The foodbank volunteers and the welfare support team continue to be strong and proactive partners.

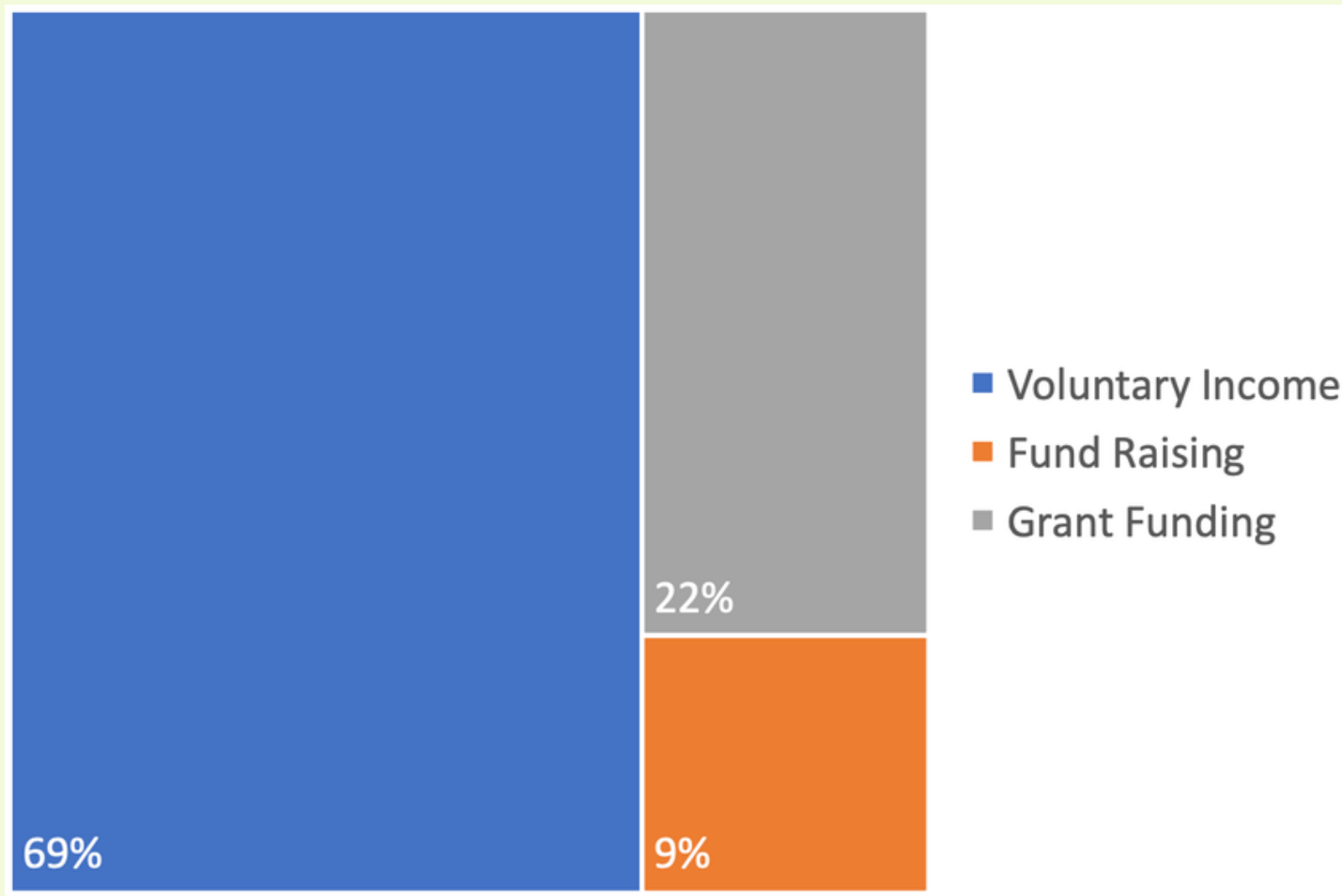
Together we address and action support for individuals in a timely and dignified way.

There are many examples of people who have received support and no longer need to visit the foodbank.

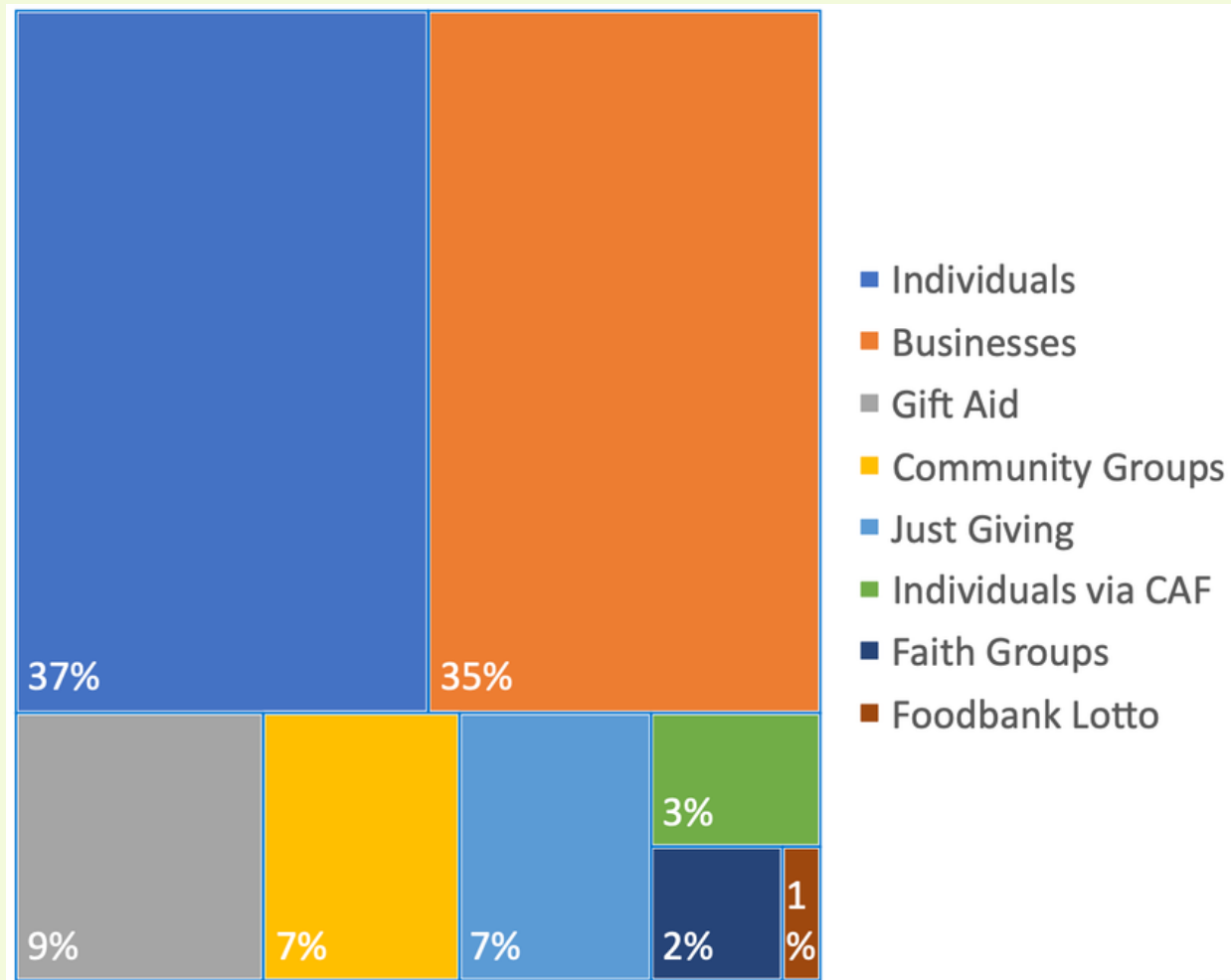
There are other examples where people have accessed community support, and thereby reduced isolation and developed new skills and confidence.

FINANCIAL REPORT

The foodbank's financial position remains stable, supported by strong governance and robust monitoring by the board. This continued diligence helps ensure the long-term sustainability of our services.

Although our bank balance remains healthy, our overall funds are gradually reducing due to a deficit between income and expenditure. We are currently reporting a deficit of £27,345, which is slightly lower than the deficit reported last year. This shortfall is primarily the result of reduced income; however, we have adjusted our income projections to maintain manageable and sustainable monthly funding levels.

We are fortunate to receive generous and consistent support from individuals and a loyal group of local businesses. This regular giving provides us with a reliable foundation of financial security.

FINANCIAL REPORT

In addition to monthly donations, our income is supplemented by contributions from community groups, faith organisations, schools and individual supporters.

Gift Aid, JustGiving and donations made directly through our website also provide valuable income streams.

We continue to actively apply for grant funding and to carry out fundraising activities throughout the year.

While overall income has decreased this financial year, the board remains committed to prudent cost management.

Working closely with the stock team and frontline volunteers, we monitor food prices and adjust purchasing accordingly. In 2025, we also undertook a full review of client circumstances to ensure that food parcels were allocated appropriately and efficiently, avoiding unnecessary expenditure.

As always, we extend our sincere thanks to all monthly donors, partners and volunteers.

Your ongoing generosity and commitment enable us to continue making a meaningful difference to those in need within our community.

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES OF KIRKCALDY FOODBANK

I report on the financial statements of Kirkcaldy Foodbank (Scottish charity no. SC044446) for the year ended December 31, 2025, which are set out on the preceding pages.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

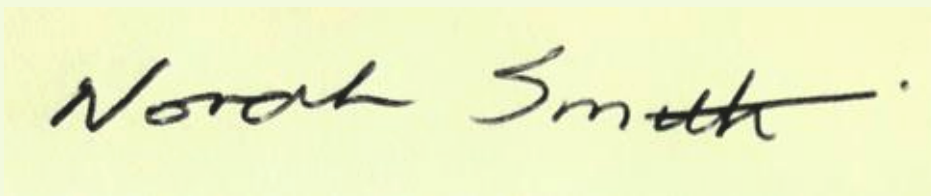
