MARNOCH PARISH CHURCH TRUSTEES' REPORT

The trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 31 December 2023. The legal and administrative information set out on page 3 forms part of this report. The accounts comply with current statutory requirements.

Governing document

The Church is administered in accordance with the terms of the Unitary Constitution.

Recruitment and appointment of trustees

Members of the Kirk Session are the charity trustees. The Kirk Session members are the elders of the church and are chosen from those members of the church who are considered to have the appropriate gifts and skills.

Organisational structure

As the church is currently in vacancy, the Kirk Session is moderated by the Interim Moderator and continues to meet approximately eight times a year. The Session is responsible for all matters relating to the upkeep and smooth running of the church. Within the Kirk Session there is a Fabric Group responsible for the upkeep of the church and a Fellowship and Fundraising Group who arrange social events to raise funds for general congregational purposes and any other relevant cause applicable at that time. The Kirk Session is also responsible for spiritual affairs within the church.

Objectives and Activities

The Church of Scotland is Trinitarian in doctrine, reformed in tradition and Presbyterian in policy. It exists to glorify God and to work for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom throughout the world. As a national church, it acknowledges a distinctive call and duty to bring the ordinances of religion to the people in every church in Scotland through a territorial ministry. It co-operates with other Churches in various ecumenical bodies in Scotland and beyond.

Regular weekly worship has taken place each Sunday at 10.30am, under the auspices of Locum Minister, who has been overseen b Interim Moderator.

The Thrift Shop, at 120 Main Street, Aberchirder, continues to provide a valuable service, with the continuing operation of a Food Bank within the shop, administered and run by church volunteers.

Fundraising events were held during the year, including a coffee morning in April and the church's popular Strawberry Fayre in July. The church was also represented at the Village Hall Christmas Fayre in November and the Farmers' Market in December. The Summer Picnic, although not a fundraising activity, was successful, running in partnership with a Songs of Praise event in the church.

Achievements and Performance

This has been a testing year for Marnoch Church. Continuing in vacancy, without a full-time Minister, means it continues to be a time of transition and consolidation. Talks with the neighbouring parishes of Turriff, Monquitter and New Byth, and King Edward have carried on throughout the year, with the prospect of union between the churches coming closer, although much work remains to be done. Successful joint services have taken place with partner churches, each being successful and a positive foreshadowing of what will be to come.

Additional services to the usual diet of Sunday worship have taken place through the year, examples being the outdoor Remembrance Service in November, additional Easter services and Christmas services such as Carols by Candelight and Christmas Eve Watchnight.

Kids' Kirk, while depleted by the departure of one of the families who had helped to sustain it has continued throughout the year year, with weekly activities and Bible-based learning, while the Food Bank has continued to provide a much-needed source of support to the local community. Fundraising activities, when they have taken place, have been largely successful.

The Kirk roll for 2023 was 295 (2022 - 304).

Financial Review

The financial resources of our congregation continued to be under stress in 2023, with monthly receipts often failing to meet monthly payments. Throughout the year, offerings and donations fell while costs continued to rise.

In September, the two year energy contact for the Church came to an end with the new contact through the Church of Scotland bringing a substantial increase in charges. The Council Tax empty building allowance for our Manse also came to an end bringing a return to the full rate. The Manse proved a further significant expense through heating bills incurred during the colder months and an increase in Insurance due to the empty building status. The Kirk Session has been endeavouring to obtain consent from the General Trustees of the Church of Scotland to have the building put up for sale as it will not be required by the Turriff Churches Grouping.

With our pulpit remaining vacant throughout the year, a locum salary had to be met, including an increase in locum rates introduced by the Church of Scotland in August. Our congregation also had their Giving to Grow contribution (previously known as Ministries contribution) to make each month, albeit it with a vacancy allowance applied against it in view of our minister provision within the Turriff Grouping remaining undecided. The Kirk Session is of the view that the falling rate of offerings and donations throughout the year may have been partly attributable to uncertainty about the status of our Church within the Turriff Grouping as patterns of church attendance were observed to be fairly irregular. A general downturn in the economic climate may also have affected the ability of our members to review their level of giving.

On a more positive note, the Fellowship and Fundraising Committee worked hard to continue the calendar of regular activities with social events well supported. The Thrift Shop volunteers also maintained their efforts, helping to make up our budget shortfall each month. Fortuitously, interest rates on our invested funds were good as was the return from the Consolidated Fund which holds monies from the sale of Marnoch Old Church. These made a significant contribution to our revenue stream along with the annual claim for Gift Aid from HMRC.

With regard to property maintenance, essential electrical work was carried out to replace antiquated consumer units in the Church. Repairs and painting to plasterboard and cornicing were required as a result of water ingress. A building inspection by the Presbytery Property Convener took place during the year and his report identified a number of other issues which have been taken in hand by the Kirk Session. At a practical level, managing our church finances became more difficult in the course of the year with the Turriff branch of Virgin Money closing in the autumn. Much of our regular banking needs must now be managed online and through the local Post Office.

A group of volunteers continued to operate the Church foodbank each Wednesday throughout the year with costs met by our Charity Fund. The Kirk Session has reluctantly decided that the foodbank can only be sustained into mid 2024 as our Charity fund is now significantly depleted and the remaining balance will be required to ensure the Thrift Shop can remain open. A number of charities received support through special collections and retiring offerings at our services. These included MAF, Poppy Scotland, the Syrian earthquake appeal, Scotscare in London, the Barnabas Fund for Ukraine and our own foodbank.

In view of rising energy bills, the charge made for funerals of £70 has become insufficient to meet heating costs therefore these charges are to be reviewed in early 2024. The Kirk Session is fully aware of the downturn in our finances and are making every effort to keep costs as low as possible. However, it would seem that the withdrawal of invested funds will be required in 2024 to meet ongoing monthly budget deficits. Our congregation looks forward to a more stable position for our church and its ministry in Marnoch as developments in the Turriff Churches Grouping proceed more rapidly through the ongoing work of the Steering Group appointed to progress matters.

Reserves

It is the Trustees' policy to hold revenue reserves of approximately two months expenditure in a bank current account for general congregational purposes.

A separate bank account is maintained to hold reserves for the fabric of the church. This is specifically for the upkeep of church properties and the purchase of music resources for use in worship. Funds held in this account will reflect the requirements of the property sub-committee and are reviewed as needed.

Volunteers

The charity is dependent on the voluntary efforts of its members for a great deal of its activities. It is not practicable to attempt to quantify this.

Risk

The charity has reviewed the major risks as identified by the trustees and has put in place procedures to mitigate these.

I report on the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2023 set out on pages 8 to 13.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006. The charity trustees consider that the audit requirement of Regulation 10(1) (d) of the Accounts Regulations does not apply. It is my responsibility to examine the accounts as required under section 44(1) (c) of the Act and to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of independent examiner's statement

My examination is carried out in accordance with Regulation 11 of the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeks explanations from the trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit and, consequently, I do not express an audit opinion on the accounts.

MARNOCH PARISH CHURCH NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2023

Purpose of Designated Funds

Fabric Fund

The Trustees have set aside funds for the maintenance and upkeep of Marnoch New Church (including the organ), Marnoch Old Church and the Manse. Investment income is received into the Kirk Session Reserve Account at Virgin Money and bills for property maintenance are paid from this account.

Sunday School Fund

This fund has been set aside to support work with children and young people. Annual interest from the Sunday School investments is received into the Virgin Money Sunday School Account.

Church of Scotland Guild Fund

The Church Guild keeps its own accounts and appoints a Guild Treasurer responsible for managing the Guild Bank Account.

Purpose of Restricted Funds

Collections for 3rd party causes

This fund consists of special collections received from the congregation towards third party organisations.

Charities Fund

The Charities Account receives income from funds invested through bequests and gifts made by local residents for the benefit of the poor and needy of the parish and for good causes in the local community. It has been used to sustain the Food Bank, which is held in the Thrift Shop once a week.

The Jim Allan Fund

This annual donation from **Example 1** is to be used at the minister's discretion. A separate account is kept to manage these funds. The last donation made was received in December 2021. During the year this account was closed due to having no replacement minister.

Stronach Bequest

Each year, investment income includes dividends received from a bequest by William and Anna Stronach in 1885. The declaration of trust states that the main objective of the bequest is that income is to be used to keep church properties in good condition with any surplus available for general congregational purposes. Investment income is paid into the Kirk Session General Account and is therefore recorded under unrestricted income.

Consolidated Fabric Fund

The Church of Scotland holds the balance from the sale of Marnoch Old Church. This fund can only be used for any major building works or renovations we undertake.
