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Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 March 2024

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2024. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The Trust was incorporated as a SCIO on 29 May 2014.

The Trust's purposes are to advance education, heritage and culture for people of all ages, backgrounds and levels of capability from anywhere in the world through the pursuit of archaelogical activities, in the widest possible ways, at the Ness of Brodgar and its environs.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

The year ended 31 March 2024 has been a very busy and productive year and the following report details much of what has been undertaken and achieved.

In the year ended 31 March 2024 the Trust continued excavation at the Ness of Brodgar as previous years, working in 3 main Trenches to further uncover the outstanding archaeology of this monumental Neolithic complex. A large cohort of volunteer diggers worked over 8 weeks, with a team of paid supervisory staff leading the work on increasingly complex and delicate archaeological deposits as we reached the floors of the structures currently open. Work on Structure 27, Trench T continued to demonstrate the unique and exquisite stone construction of this large building but more has to be done to allow for conclusions about its purpose to be arrived at and to date it, and it will be a major focus for work in the final excavation season at the Ness, in 2024. The recovery of samples of wood from the collapse/demolition layers within Structure 27, including part of large plank (potentially part of a roof timber), will further enhance our understanding of the use of timber in Neolithic Orkney. In Trench J where the earliest building so far encountered is being excavated, Structure 5, more evidence was uncovered as to its complex history and emphasised its early Neolithic pedigree. In the main Trench P, excavation was continued on Structures 1, 8, 10 and 12 where primary phase floor levels are being investigated. Earlier buildings under all of these structures were further revealed: in particular the nature of Structure 20 which underlies Structure 10 was clarified and proved to be yet another piered building probably contemporary with the other major later piered structures. Stringent sampling strategies continued to be applied including those for micromorph and XRF studies.

Post-excavation work continued throughout the year. An ongoing MRes by into multi hollow cobbles was concluded and he has made a PhD application for further study into the worked stone assemblage at the Ness. MRes work continued on the Loch of Stenness pollen cores, and a further MRes began, reviewing the burnt bone assemblage from Str 8. The PhD looking at Str 8 carbonised plant remains progresses and a further PhD commenced looking at enriching visitor experience with prehistory. The Chemarch Project continued with the analysis of residues on over 400 samples of pottery, as did collaboration with Trinity College, Dublin on cattle DnA. Undergraduate study also looked at the pillow stones from the Ness.

The site's remarkable GIS- build, the complex phasing of the site and all its contexts with matrices, and the work of supervisory staff writing up their structures have all progressed throughout the year, with material well in hand for all structures. The pot assemblage moved into a new phase of work, with a greater input from volunteers triaging material for specialist review. Work also, again, progressed on site records, scanning and digitalising large amounts of materials and standardising data entry. Volunteer help was vital to the pot project, to records work, washing bone for the MRes burnt bone project and 6 volunteers were at work most weeks throughout October to 31 March, plus another volunteer giving irreplaceable assistance with the Trust's on-line shop.

A large amount of time was spent working on a Heritage Lottery Fund application which was ultimately submitted on 27 March 2024, looking for £238,000 to appoint a webmaster to further improve and extend our very successful website, to appoint an Education Officer to take the Ness to both Orkney schools and others, and produce Ness-inspired learning material for use across the UK, to train volunteers in archaeological post-excavation skills for use on Ness material and in the future for other Orkney sites, to reach-out to other groups e.g. stone masons and farmers regarding the Ness and discoveries there and generally build a far-reaching outreach project to lead us into the Ness post -excavation period, including an art, films of the final season at the Ness and a graphic novel.

A specialists' gathering was also held on 14 and 15 July 2023 to bring many of the post-excavation research team to the Ness to see where excavations have reached, and to spend time discussing the likely post-excavation projects and sources of funding for same which need to be pursued. The gathering was very positive, and much work has been done on bringing together definitive proposals for both AHRC and ERC grant applications to be made over the Summer of 2024. Other project discussions were also ongoing, and a far-reaching post-excavation plan clearly emerged - now all that needs done is to fund it.

Another major project running through the latter half of the year was the design and development of a major exhibition at Orkney Museum, to run from early May 2024 to late September 2024, Ness of Brodgar: Past Present and Future. Orkney Archaeology Society were generous funders of the new exhibition book, also titled Ness of Brodgar: Past, Present & Future, and will also fund a film of the exhibition.

Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 March 2024

Fund raising, as ever, was a major undertaking throughout the year: on-site donations and shop sales, and other on-site fund-raising initiatives such as paid private site tours were successful over the summer of 2023 as were, additionally, on-line shop sales and donations generally from the public. One of the new lines for the final year of excavation, developed in the year ended 31 March 2024 has been a Ness t-shirt. Regular newsletters again were issued and these drive up mail-order purchases of all our on-line shop products. The Summer of 2024 is the final year of excavation at the Ness of Brodgar and from Christmas 2023 onwards, the Digger, Finds and Meet and Greet teams have been pulled together. There has been no shortage of volunteers, and the hope is that many visitors will join us and by their donations etc, help raise funds to see us forward into the post-excavation phase.

Online activity on our website continued to increase throughout the year, a large proportion of which is due to people planning site visits during the 2024 season. 2023 saw a record breaking 330,000 page views. This was also mirrored in social media activity, with increases in followers across the board (Instagram: 9.6k; Facebook: 8.8k; Twitter: 5.7k and Threads - a new platform: 2k).

The Ness of Brodgar Trust is a SCIO whose membership is its Charity Trustees, who also constitute the Board of Trust.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

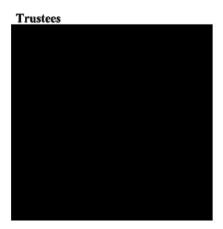

Notes to the Financial Statements for the year ended 31 March 2024

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

Income from donations and grants are recognised as incoming resources when receivable.

The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included.

Expenditure

Expenditure is included in resources expended on an expenditure basis, inclusive of any VAT which cannot be recovered.

All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the SOFA on a basis designated to reflect the use of the resource.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
