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#### Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2024

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2024. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### Objectives and aims

Our aim is to support neurological patients and carers by promoting positive health and wellbeing in the Outer Hebrides. Our purposes are:

- a. The advancement of health of those suffering from neurological conditions;
- b. The relief of those in need by reason of ill-health, disability or other disadvantage due to a neurological condition;
- c. The advancement of education specifically the understanding of neurological conditions;
- d. Organising recreational activities to improve life conditions of those suffering from or affected by neurological conditions.

#### Significant activities

Our main activities for this year have been:

1. Regular activities for members, including:

Weekly 'cuppa and catch up'. These take place each Monday at the Failte Centre.

We have had a number of speakers and activities at Cuppa and Catch up, including from health representatives, arts and crafts activities, speakers from the community including local archaeologist. RSPB, and Peatland Action. We received funding from the Agnes Hunter Trust to run regular seated yoga, gentle exercise and arts and crafts sessions, which were incredibly popular with our members.

We also took 'cuppa and catch up' on tour and were able to have meetings at other parts of Lewis and Harris including Comunn Eachdraidh Nis, Harris Hotel in Tarbert, Bernera community centre and museum, and Uig community centre.

A Christmas event was held in the Caladh Inn with Hebridean Harmony choir.

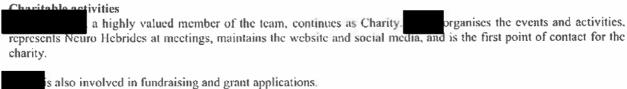
In June 2023 we held the Neuro Hebrides open day at UHI Western Isles, and welcomed over 100 people throughout the day to celebrate what makes Neuro Hebrides such a special charity, and help raise awareness of our work in order to let us reach more people affected by neurological conditions in the Outer Hebrides.

2. Involvement and representation with other agencies and on various groups including local Health Board, Managed Clinical Network and Patient Panel. These meetings took place regularly and Neuro Hebrides had representatives at these.

Neuro Hebrides now also has representation at the Neurological Alliance of Scotland, the Digital Citizen Panel, and Patient travel meetings with Stornoway Airport staff.

3. The maintenance of our website and social media postings to ensure these are up to date and to expand our reach to those who are unable to attend the meetings due to their neurological conditions. The website is easy to access and allows us to keep members up to date with what's on through the events calendar and regular blogs.

#### ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

#### Fundraising activities

We continue to have collection cans at a number of outlets across the island and are very grateful to the local community for their support.

The Stornoway half marathon in 2023 had a ceilidh and raffle following the event, and proceeds were donated to Neuro Hebrides.

There was a charity cycle ride called the Butt to Barra and Back, in which 3 people cycled over 300 miles to raise money for Neuro Hebrides. This raised over £2,000.

We received £5,000 from the Agnes Hunter Trust to run seated yoga, gentle exercise classes and arts and crafts classes.

We received a grant from UCVO to fund massage therapy for members following such positive feedback from massage therapy sessions in the previous year.

After the year-end we were successful in being awarded a further 3 years funding from RS Macdonald for funding the co-ordinator post.

We applied for the Coop Community fund, and were successful in the applications associated with 3 stores, in Lewis, Uist and Barra. The Community fund lasts for 1 year from October 2023, and 2 payments will be made to the charity. The amount will be dependent on how many people in the local community choose Neuro Hebrides when they shop at Coop.

Neuro Hebrides also obtained a grant from The Outer Hebrides Community Led Local Development fund to purchase two Beach Wheelchairs and equipment costing £8,752 in total. One beach wheelchair is for use in Lewis and one for use in Uist

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

#### Reserves policy

The charity is seeking to build reserves to be in a position of having three months in reserves at all times. This target will be kept under review as the activities of the organisation develop.

### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

#### Governing document

The Charity is governed by its constitution, which received approval from OSCR on 8 May 2019.

The charity is a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (SCIO).

# Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Trustees are expected to serve for a minimum of three years. The board shall consider the suggestion that only a third of eligible trustees should retire at the AGM held three years after the initial trustees were appointed. Retiring trustees are eligible for reappointment. Each AGM and the board may appointment a member to be a charity trustee.

# Organisational structure

The affairs of the charity are under the control of the charity trustees, with a co-ordinating group elected by the members of the organisation for the day to day running of the charity and forward planning.

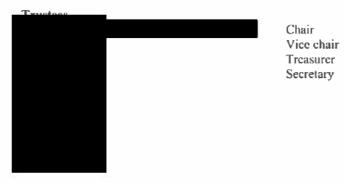

#### Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

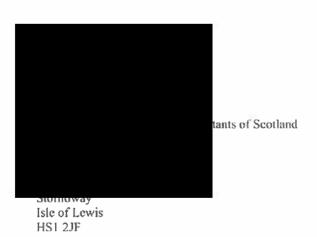
#### Independent examiner's statement

# Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2024

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

#### Receipts and Payments Accounts

The accounts are prepared on a cash receipts and payments basis.

#### Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

#### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.
