Trustees' Report
Year ended 31 December 2025

The trustees present their annual report and financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2025. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in the notes to the accounts and comply with the General Assembly Regulations for Congregational Finance, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended) and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland effective from 1 January 2019.

Objectives and Activities

The Church of Scotland is Trinitarian in doctrine, Reformed in tradition and Presbyterian in polity. It exists to glorify God and to work for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom throughout the world. As a national Church, it acknowledges a distinctive call and duty to bring the ordinances of religion to the people in every parish of Scotland through a territorial ministry. It co-operates with other Churches in various ecumenical bodies in Scotland and beyond.

As a community of God's people at Paisley West Church, our main objectives are:

To offer Christian worship, fellowship, instruction, mission and service.

To make known the relevance of the Christian message to the lives of people in the 21st Century.

To bring the ordinances of religion to the people within our congregation and parish.

Our goals are to present an inviting, modern and caring aspect to our local community. The desire to do so underlines our plans to modernise our halls, thus offering a more inviting environment to current and prospective users of our premises. Our policy is of inclusion rather than exclusion in regard to use of our halls by others.

Within this congregation these objectives are purposed, inter alia, by holding a service of worship every Sunday and on other occasions as determined by the Kirk Session, the provision of Christian education for young people through a Sunday School, opportunities for Christian fellowship through various group activities for young people through a Boys' Brigade Company, and making the premises available to girls groups connected to the Guide Association.

The past few years have been difficult due to the position of Minister being vacant, with some people joining other Churches and others saying they will return when the position has been filled.

The Pastoral Care Team continue to run the "Wee Blether" group on a Monday to encourage people to come to the Church Hall for companionship, food, and warmth; due to high energy prices. They also provide regular film shows on a Saturday afternoon.

Throughout the year we have had a few retiral offerings, donating to Crossreach Adams House; Accord Hospice; Christian Aid; Combat Stress; Help for Heroes; and Holy Land Fund.

During the past year there has been an increase in activity within the Church due to events organised by the Pastoral Team. This has greatly benefitted our income and fundraising activities. However, our members are getting older and we have lost a great number of our members. We have made contact in order to improve the roll; however, sadly, we have lost members due to ill health, poor mobility, and a number of our members passed away. Some members decided to leave due to us not having a Minister for a number of years.

We now stream the Sunday services online for those who are unable to come to Church.

Achievements and Performance

Paisley West Church came into being in June 2021 due to the joyous union of St Columba, Foxbar and Martyrs Church, Paisley.

We have continued to uphold our commitment to regular worship where possible; however, we have lost a great number of members in the past year, reducing attendance at weekly worship services. We have been able to resume some of our various congregational activities and other organised events. We can be confident about our ability, talents and resources to meet the various challenges our Church and community will face in the foreseeable future. This has been an extremely happy union with everyone joining in. We are now live streaming services for those unable to attend on Sundays.

Financial Review

The main source of income is weekly freewill offerings from the congregation, givings by means of standing orders and general donations. Additional income is generated by members agreeing to pledge funds under the gift aid scheme, allowing tax to be reclaimed by the Church. The combined income from these sources in 2025 was £44,511, a similar figure to 2024. We have lost a number of regular members this year, due to their sad passing.

The regular fund generating activities of our Sunday morning tea/coffee, home baking, contributed £2,603 to the Fund Raising Fund in the year. The figure last year was £2,198. Costs have increased at an alarming rate this year, especially gas and electricity, in line with inflation; although we do have the additional running costs of the vacant manse.

In financial terms, the Church has shown a deficit of £15,559 in the year. We had significant upkeep costs of the empty Manse, although various monies were refunded from the General Trustees in respect of these costs. Our investments with the Church of Scotland Investors Trust have increased by £2,201 in the year due to market forces. We will continue to monitor our present position closely, due to the present financial and political uncertainties, which inevitably means that members are also under financial pressures.

Risk Management

The Church lives in challenging times and the Trustees feel it is prudent to consider issues which were problematic for us.

The vacancy has caused us to lose a lot of members. We had a Locum Minister, however, permission to call a new Minister was granted, and Rev William McCulloch was inducted on 19th February 2026.

Our congregation is ageing and many of our members are housebound or require care or live in care establishments. This brings increased and changed responsibility in the way we maintain our fellowship and worship.

The cost of maintaining Church buildings and fabric, which are dated, imposes a considerable burden on the income and resources of our Church. We are presently meeting this burden thanks to the generosity of our members but continuing prudent management of our finances and funds is critical. We still have the upkeep and maintenance of the vacant manse.

The Church Halls are again being effectively let and income from lets helps with revenue for the Church. There is a Line Dance Class; a Zumba Class; and events held on a regular basis by the Pastoral Team.

Reserves Policy

The charity trustees have considered the reserves required and have taken into account their current and future liabilities. It is the Trustees' policy to hold reserves of approximately six months expenditure including designated funds. At the year end the Church held unrestricted funds of £47,437 (excluding Manse) of which £5,344 had been designated for property maintenance. The remaining balance of £42,093 represents just over six months expenditure. This situation will continue to be monitored very closely.

The church also held £11,413 of restricted funds which have been provided for the purposes specified in Note 16.

Structure, Governance and Management

The congregation is a registered charity, number SC005770 and is administered in accordance with the terms of the Deed of Constitution (Unitary Form) and is subject to the Acts and Regulations of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland.

Members of the Kirk Session are the charity trustees. The Kirk Session members are the elders of the church and are chosen from those members of the Church who are considered to have the appropriate gifts and skills. The minister, who is a member of the Kirk Session, is elected by the congregation and inducted by Presbytery. The Kirk Session which meets quarterly throughout the year is responsible for spiritual affairs within the Church. There are seven main committees of the Kirk Session, namely:- Finance, Property, Communication & Publicity, Mission & Education, Pastoral Care, Fund Raising and Social & Child Protection.

Trustees' Responsibilities in Relation to the Financial Statements

The charity trustees are responsible for preparing a trustees' annual report and financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

The law applicable to charities in Scotland requires the charity trustees to prepare financial statements for each year which show a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the income and expenses of the charity for that period. In preparing the financial statements, the trustees are required to:

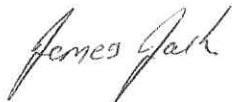
- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the method and principles in the applicable Charities SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed, subject to any departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operational existence.

The trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the charity's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended). They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The trustees are responsible for the maintenance and integrity of the charity and financial information on the congregation's website. Legislation in the United Kingdom governing the preparation and dissemination of financial statements may differ from legislation in other jurisdictions.

Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of Paisley West Church
Year ended 31 December 2025**

I report on the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2025 which are set out on pages 1 to 12.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended).

The charity trustees consider that the audit requirement of Regulation 10(1) (a) to (c) of the Accounts Regulations does not apply. It is my responsibility to examine the accounts as required under section 44(1) (c) of the Act and to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of independent examiner's statement

My examination is carried out in accordance with Regulation 11 of the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended). An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeks explanations from the trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the view given by the accounts.

Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies, which have been applied consistently in the current and preceding period in dealing with items which are considered material to the accounts, are set out below.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standards applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) effective from 1 January 2019 and the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102), the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended).

Fund accounting

Funds are classified as either restricted funds or unrestricted funds, defined as follows.

Restricted funds are funds subject to specific requirements as to their use which may be declared by the donor or with their authority or created through legal processes, but still within the wider objects of the charity.

Endowment funds are funds which have been given on the condition that the original capital sum is not reduced, but the income there from is used for the purpose defined in accordance with the objects of the charity.

Unrestricted funds are expendable at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the objects of the charity. If parts of the unrestricted funds are earmarked at the discretion of the trustees for a particular purpose, they are designated as a separate fund. This designation has an administrative purpose only and does not legally restrict the trustees' discretion to apply the fund.

Recognition of income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Donated services and facilities

Donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised as income when the charity has control over the item, any conditions associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use by the charity of the item is probable and that economic benefit can be measured reliably. In accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS102) the general volunteer time of congregation members is not recognised.

On receipt, donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market; a corresponding amount is then recognised as expenditure in the period of receipt.

Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the Bank.

Recognition and allocation of expenditure

Expenditure is included in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis and is recognised when there is a legal or constructive obligation to pay for expenditure.

Fixed Assets

The charity has the right to occupy and use for its charitable objects certain tangible fixed assets, including the Church, halls and manse. The Church and halls at King Street and the Manse are vested in the name of Local Trustees and are in the hands of the solicitors, Cochran Dickie. No consideration is payable for the use of these assets. Expenditure incurred on the repair and maintenance of these assets is charged as resources expended in the Statement of Financial Activities in the period in which the liability arises.

Heritable properties consisting of the Church and halls are not recorded in the accounts. The trustees consider that it would be impractical to apply conventional valuation techniques to these buildings and accordingly no valuations are available.

Investments

Fixed asset investments are stated at market value at the balance sheet date. Unrealised gains and losses represent the difference between the market value at the beginning and end of the financial year or, if purchased in the year, the difference between cost and market value at the end of the year. Realised gains and losses represent the difference between the proceeds on disposal and the market value at the start of the year or cost if purchased in the year.

Taxation

Paisley West Church is recognised as a charity for the purposes of applicable taxation legislation and is therefore not subject to taxation on its charitable activities. The charity is not registered for VAT and resources expended therefore include irrecoverable input VAT.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand and deposits held with the Investors Trust.

Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any discounts due.

Creditors

Creditors are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.
