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## **REPORT OF TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022**

The trustees present their report and financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2022.

# **1. GOVERNING DOCUMENT**

The Church is administered in accordance with the terms of the Model Deed of Constitution.

# 2. RECRUITMENT AND APPOINTMENT OF TRUSTEES

Members of the Kirk Session and the Congregational Board are the charity trustees. The Kirk Session members are the elders of the church and are chosen from those members of the church who are considered to have the appropriate gifts and skills. The Minister, who is a member of the Kirk Session, is elected by the congregation and inducted by the Presbytery. The Congregational Board is appointed from within the congregation and members of the congregation are invited to nominate individuals who are believed to have the skills and commitment to contribute to the management affairs of the Church, to become members of the Board. Board Members are then appointed at the Stated Annual Meeting and serve for a period of three years after which they must seek re-election at the next Stated Annual Meeting.

# 3. ORGANISATIONAL STRUCTURE

The Congregational Board is chaired by the Minister and normally meets fives times in a year. Certain responsibilities are delegated to the Finance Committee and the Property (Fabric) Committee as appropriate. The Kirk Session, which meets six times a year, is responsible for the spiritual affairs within the church.

## 4. OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The Church of Scotland is Trinitarian in doctrine, Reformed in tradition and Presbyterian in polity. It exists to glorify God and to work for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom throughout the world. As a national Church, it acknowledges a distinctive call and duty to bring the ordinances of religion to the people in every parish of Scotland through a territorial ministry. It co-operates with other Churches in various ecumenical bodies in Scotland and beyond.

Services of Worship are conducted every Sunday throughout the year, with some additional services on specific occasions. The FOG (Friends of God) Squad also meets during the school term each Sunday morning, catering for children aged 3 to 11 years of age. A variety of fund-raising events take place each year, ranging from craft evenings to coffee mornings. A few social events are arranged to foster and encourage fellowship within the congregation and parish.

# 5. ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Measures aimed at stemming the spread of the Omicron variant meant that we began 2022 cautiously. However, restrictions were soon lifted, and we saw a steady increase of people returning to onsite church services.

Our church social activities such as Coffee and Chat, Needles and Pins, and the Men's Breakfast resumed. The Friendship Circle began meeting again and a new venture, Panbride

Musical Memories, took place in the Panbride Hall. In the autumn the popular "Soup and Sweet" returned.

Panbride Hall and Newton Hall continued to be used on an almost daily basis by the congregation and the wider community including Alzheimer Scotland, Carnoustie and District Pipe Band, Arbroath & Carnoustie Instrumental Band, Carnoustie Recorded Music Circle, Dundee & Angus Bird Club, Yoga, Pilates, Notorious Dance Group and School of Irish Dancing. Towards the end of the year, we welcomed back the children of Carlogie Primary with their Fairlogie Café.

Our young people in JAFFA and the F.O.G. Squad continued to meet,

In March, Newton Church was the venue for The World Day of Prayer and our Lent Bible Study was "From Now On" based on the musical, The Greatest Showman.

The Worship Team as well as being involved with Sunday worship also participated in the Holy Week Services which we were able to livestream from the Panbride Hall. The Service of Shadows took place in Newton Church on Maundy Thursday. There was an early morning Family Service on Easter Sunday with breakfast in the Panbride Hall.

In May our church hosted the Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland during his visit to Angus. The second toured Carnoustie and East Haven and had lunch in the Panbride Hall

In June it was wonderful to have Carlogie Primary School in church for their End of Term and Prizegiving Service. We also had a wonderful Pentecost Picnic in the Manse Garden after the F.O.G. Squad prizegiving service.

Summer services took place in Panbride Church.

Two new ventures began in July - Walk and Talk and Mid-week Evening Worship.

In August the annual Congregational Day out was to Pitlochry. Despite a wet start to the day, the sun shone later, and a wonderful day was had by all.

During the year our Social and Fundraising Committee hosted a Coffee and Pancake morning and a wonderful evening of music featuring The Fiddlin' Freens and Just 3 Folk.

Our youth group, JAFFA, had several fundraisers including a book sale, for the Ukraine.

At Harvest our church was beautifully decorated, and posies were given to the elderly and housebound.

During the year we held retiring offerings for Disasters Emergency Committee Ukraine Humanitarian Appeal, Royal British Legion Foodbank, Erskine Hospital, and CrossReach. The Coffee and Chat group also donated Christmas Boxes to the Blythswood Shoebox Appeal.

Our Advent Bible Study was "Travelling Light" where we travelled to Bethlehem with the different bible characters from the Christmas story.

In December the F.O.G. Squad enjoyed a movie night in the church hall, The Nativity, and entertained us with their own Nativity, "Angel's View".

At Christmas time it was great to be able to have all our usual services including Service of Remembrance and Hope, Christingle, Carols by Candlelight, Watchnight, and Christmas Day Family Service. Carlogie Primary School also had their Christmas Service in Newton Church.

It was a delight to be able to be back in the various care homes for Christmas Carol services accompanied by members of our newly formed Pastoral Care Team.

After much work from our Thinking Ahead group a new look website was launched.

Throughout the year our worship services were live streamed to our Facebook page and posted to our YouTube channel.

# 6. FINANCIAL REVIEW

The surplus for the year amounted to  $\pounds 6,374$ , a very positive given that church activities continued to be curtailed by covid restrictions for the first few months of the year.

The principal source of income continues to be from members by way of weekly freewill offerings, gift aid donations and the open plate.

### 7. RESERVES

It is the Trustees' policy to hold reserves which are believed prudent in the light of both ongoing known revenue expenditure, and the potential high costs of a capital nature. At the year end the Church held unrestricted cash funds of £124,680. This equates to approximately seventeen months recurring expenditure, which the Trustees consider to be a reasonable reserve at year end.

# 8. STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES

The members of the Kirk Session and Congregational Board must prepare financial statements which give sufficient detail to enable an appreciation of the transactions of the Church during the financial year. The members of the Kirk Session and Congregational Board are responsible

for keeping proper accounting records which, on request, must reflect the financial position of the Church at that time. This must be done to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 and the Regulations Anent Congregational Finance approved by the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland in 2007. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Church and must take reasonable steps for the prevention and/or detection of fraud and other irregularities.

# Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of Carnoustie Panbride Church

I report on the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2021 which are set out on pages 8 to 13.

#### **Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner**

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustees Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006.

The charity trustees consider that the audit requirement of Regulation 10(1) (d) of the Accounts Regulations does not apply. It is my responsibility to examine the accounts as required under Section 44(1) (c) of the Act and to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

#### **Basis of independent examiner's statement**

My examination is carried out in accordance with Regulation 11 of the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes

consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeks explanations from the trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the view given by the accounts.
