## **Trustees Annual Report Year to 31st December 2023**

### **Structure, Governance and Management**

The Church is administered in accordance with the terms of the Unitarian Deed of Constitution.

### **Recruitment and Appointment of Trustees**

Members of the Kirk Session are the charity trustees. The Kirk Session members are the elders of the church and are chosen from those members of the church who are considered to have the appropriate gifts and skills. The minister, who is a member of the Kirk Session, is elected by the congregation and inducted by Presbytery.

### **Organisational Structure**

The Kirk Session which meets nine times a year is responsible for spiritual, financial and property affairs within the church.

### **Objectives and Activities**

The Church of Scotland is Trinitarian in doctrine, Reformed in tradition and Presbyterian in polity. It exists to glorify God and to work for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom throughout the world. As a national Church, it acknowledges a distinctive call and duty to bring the ordinances of religion to the people in every parish of Scotland through a territorial ministry. It co-operates with other Churches in various ecumenical bodies in Scotland and beyond.

Our statement of identity as Knightswood Anniesland Trinity Church reads as follows:

We aspire to be:

A CARING, Christ – centred family,  
EXPLORING together the nature of God and his plan for us  
JOYFULLY exploring the good news of His unconditional love  
CHANGING LIVES by means of worship, prayer and example

This statement reflects our desire for all people to know that they are welcome to find out about the Christian faith, in a language which is relevant to their thinking and lives, and praying that God will touch all people in our parish by His Holy Spirit

### **Achievements and Performance**

Worship in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, is at the heart of our church family, and in the year of 2023, we have sought to keep worship and our expression of devotion to our Lord Jesus Christ at the centre of our identity. In 2023, we were working with "Designed To Succeed" and hoped to have a decision regarding which of our buildings we might be keeping. Sadly, this proved not to be the case, and we have found this disappointing and divisive. In the middle of this, we have striven to keep lines of communication open, and to be focussed on building up the people of God.

2023 has been the second year of the newly formed church Knightswood Anniesland Trinity church, composed of the former Knightswood St Margaret's church and former Temple Anniesland church. It has been challenging to bring together two former congregations as well as working more closely in our parish grouping with St David's Knightswood church, as we prepare for union with them in October 2024. We have had a number of joint parish grouping events, including a joint Souper Sunday event in the St Margaret's building in the autumn of the year.

As KAT church, we have sought to worship together each Sunday at 11am, one month in one building, and the alternate month in the other building. This has meant a major rethink of traditions, teams and routines, which has been unsettling. It has been good to worship together however, and to strengthen friendships.

After reports and presentations were given by Designed To Succeed In March, about the development opportunities in the Anniesland and St Margaret's building to enable mission, a Presbytery vote was taken on this

issue, as outlined in the basis of union. However it became apparent, that though no one's fault, that the voting procedure in the Knightswood Anniesland Trinity church was not robust, and so the vote was not valid, and Presbytery apologised for this. Initially it was thought that the vote might be rerun, but because of the time line and the tensions amongst the congregations, the parish grouping council decided to ask Presbytery for arbitrators to make the building decisions for us. A "scheme of delegation" was set up by Presbytery, in consultation with the Principal clerk of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland - three people with relevant skill sets, to make a missional decision about which building/ buildings might be the right configuration for the future. The decisions will be relayed to the congregations in April 2024, and then will be brought to the May Presbytery meeting. The nature of all that took place brought about frustration and bad feeling, and has been a setback in trust and in our working together. We have encouraged people to talk though how they feel, but in a constructive and kindly manner.

We have continued to offer people zoom options for Sunday worship, and our website and facebook pages offer up to date reflections and local and national information about the life of the church.

In worship, we have been delighted that our church choir has continued under the leadership of Christine Furnish, and has gained some new members. I have appreciated [REDACTED] being willing to act as church officer in both buildings, and for his consistency and willingness to help out where-ever possible. I am indebted to [REDACTED] for co-ordinating the tea and coffee teams on a Thursday morning at the service. It has been wonderful to participate in the Tuesday café in the St Margaret's building, and [REDACTED] the team have done a fantastic job in enabling this to flourish with a number of themed occasions, and inviting new people along. The Friday Annie's café in the Anniesland building has also restarted, ably led by [REDACTED] and this has also been a good place for people to come along and sing, line dance and craft. In 2023, our student [REDACTED] finished his placement, and we wish him every blessing for the future.

The year has been characterised by community concerts, the first being in March, where all the church and community organisations in both Knightswood Anniesland buildings, were invited to participate. This led to a very enthusiastic and well attended concert, where people - children and adults of all ages showcased their skills and talents. There was an additional concert in October, co-ordinated by people involved with Crossrock, and in memory of the late [REDACTED] one of the former elders in Anniesland. This brought together a number of people from the past and present, and a Programme of music, poetry and story was designed round the theme of 'The Four Seasons' to honour [REDACTED] life. Over £ 500 was raised for " 3 D Drumchapel".

We have also run a joint Alpha course with St David's, and a number of Retreats, especially one with [REDACTED] author of "Sensible Shoes."

I had to take some time off in the autumn during the final illness and death of my mum. I am very grateful to have two session clerks, [REDACTED] both of whom have worked tirelessly and supportively over the last year. [REDACTED] has been a wise guide, with a great sense of humour, and been particularly helpful with minutes and procedures. [REDACTED] has also been immensely supportive, with both a number of administrative tasks, and organised a number of church events to bring people together, which have been very successful, especially the Christmas fair and Community Christmas service.

[REDACTED] our family and youth worker has worked patiently and steadily through the practical challenges of hosting Sunday club and Messy church in two different buildings. This has been very demanding, and yet she has managed everything with great grace. She has always gone the extra mile. Our number of families have fluctuated a bit, but it has been a particular blessing to have a three day holiday club in 2023, and to reach out to new families. [REDACTED] has also been instrumental in her role as Communications team co-ordinator, in getting our new office systems running, and we have two volunteers to help, which has been greatly encouraging, and is helping us get out administration a bit smoother, and everything backed up on the cloud.

We have sought to rebuild our teams in this second year, but it is still a work in progress. I am particularly indebted to [REDACTED] for her vast amount of work in getting the accounts ready for 2023, ably assisted by [REDACTED]

In 2023, we are still missing a number of people who have been unsure of returning after the pandemic, even now. There have been a considerable number of deaths both in the church family and the parish, and we pray for all those affected and for those who are bereaved. We held an evening service at the end of November for those who experienced loss, and offered hospitality afterwards.

We have been delighted to have our youth organisations join us in worship at Remembrance and at Christmas, and for all their support at the Christmas fair. It has been great to have all our Christmas services, coffee mornings and celebratory activities in the Advent season, especially our Christingle, Watchnight and Christmas day services, which offer opportunity for the people in the parish to come along. We have been working again with our local schools, both Primary and secondary schools. There have been weekly services at Oakbridge led by [REDACTED] and monthly services at Castlebank Avenue and Dundas court, as well as seeking to keep in touch with Phoenix. We have raised awareness and been fundraising for Blythwood, Tear Fund and Christian Aid, Comfort International, and also supported CSW and other local charities.

There are so many who have helped [REDACTED] helping with fabric, and many supporting each other through pastoral care and prayer. I am very grateful to [REDACTED] for all letting requests and arrangements. My thanks to [REDACTED] for their ongoing ministry of flowers, which is so meaningful to so many. Marion has resigned as flower convener, after a period of ill health, and we miss her. I am grateful for [REDACTED] and the magazine team who have kept the congregation informed with regular magazines and information. It has been an unsettling period not having answers regarding the shape of the future, and we pray for a specific way forward which will enable a healthy Christian witness in this area in the years to come.

It has been encouraging to see new teams form, and friendships deepen over the last years. So much has been achieved. However we need to build on this, to bring people back, to consolidate our teams, and reach out more intentionally into the community to share the good news of our faith with others.

We remember the words of Peter, when he sees Jesus walking on water "Lord if it's you, tell me to walk on the water. "Come" Jesus said. Matthew 14: 27-28

Peter took his eyes off Jesus, and began to sink amongst the waves, and Jesus immediately caught him by the hand. Just now, God seems to be asking us to get out of the boat, where things were safe and familiar, and to take risks, and to try and new more missional ways forward. May we have courage to take that next step, even in the midst of uncertainty, and to take a leap of faith, for the sake of the congregation and the community, and so we may follow Christ's call.

### **Financial Review**

The charity is still paying for the upkeep of 2 buildings and at the same time we have lost some members. This is having a negative impact on our finances. This year we required to pay for an architect to draw up provisional plans for both buildings to ensure that when a decision is made regarding the buildings, plans are in place to apply for planning permission etc to enable us to move forward.

Offerings for 2023 were down by 7% but rental from hall letting was up by 20% to £21424. Coffee mornings, fellowship after Sunday services, fairs etc were held throughout the year and so this was another stream of income. Other charities also benefitted considerably from this source in addition to benefitting from retiral collections after communion services.

Income from funerals was down to £1300 during 2023.

Gift Aid continues to be an important source of income for us. Including GASDS, the charity was able to claim £13561.32 and it is anticipated that in January 2024 £4727.75 from the fourth quarter will be received.

The charity continues to benefit from its investment in the Church of Scotland Investors' Trust Income Fund which brought in £10,121.50 in dividends and the market value rose to £221,863.

The Trustees are aware that money will require to be drawn down from investments in COSIT to enable whichever building is chosen to be brought up to standard to make it fit for purpose for the future.

The charity is fortunate to have both capital and revenue funds available which are held by the Church of Scotland General Trustees on our behalf ( see Appendix ) to enable us to carry out the necessary work. We also have sufficient funds with COSIT to satisfy our reserves policy.

The Trustees are satisfied with the financial position of the church at the start of 2024.

### **Reserves Policy**

The Trustees have considered the reserves required and have taken into account their current and future liabilities to the extent that they are foreseeable. It is the Trustees' policy to hold reserves of at least six months expenditure approximately including designated funds. At the year end the church held unrestricted funds of £99,488 of which £6,599 had been designated for the Individual Assistance Fund and £2,205 for the Youth Worker Fund, as well as the invested capital in the Church of Scotland Investment Trust Income Fund which is designated to the General Fund. The Trustees will keep these reserves under review during the year but are currently satisfied that the charity's reserve policy is being met. At the year end the charity also held £13,175 of restricted funds which have been provided for the purposes specified in Note 2 to the accounts.

### **Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities**

The Trustees must prepare financial statements which give sufficient detail to enable an appreciation of the transactions of the Church during the financial year. The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which, on request, must reflect the financial position of the Church at that time. This must be done to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended) and the Regulations Anent Congregational Finance approved by the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland in 2016. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Church and must take reasonable steps for the prevention and/or detection of fraud and other irregularities.

**Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of Glasgow: Knightswood Anniesland Trinity Church of Scotland**

I report on the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2023 which are set out on pages 8 to 14.

**Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner**

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended).

The charity trustees consider that the audit requirement of Regulation 10(1)(d) of the Accounts Regulations does not apply. It is my responsibility to examine the accounts as required under section 44(1)(c) of the Act and to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

**Basis of independent examiner's statement**

An examination is carried out in accordance with Regulation 11 of the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended). An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeks explanations from the trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the view given by the accounts.

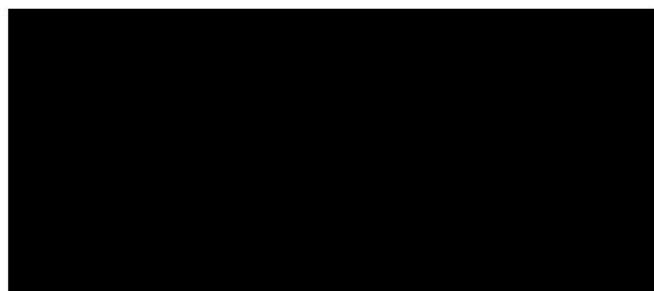

**2 Movement in Funds (contd)**

**Purpose of Funds**

**Designated funds**

*Fabric Fund:* The trustees have set aside funds for the maintenance of the church property.

*Reserve Fund:* The trustees have set aside funds for the general use of the church and to be used when there is a deficit in the General Fund.

*Youth Worker Fund:* The trustees have designated this fund to pay for a youth worker.

*Individual Assistance Fund:* This fund was set up by the trustees using a donation to be flexibly used for the benefit of individuals who are not trustees needing financial support in any area of the church's charitable work.

*Events Fund:* The trustees have designated this fund for monies received and paid for running community events.

**Restricted funds**

*Benevolent Fund:* This is a fund for the use of the minister to give assistance to those in need.

*Flower Fund:* A fund to facilitate the purchase of flowers for the church by way of donations.

*Audio Visual Fund:* This is a fund set up to collect donations to pay for the installation and upkeep of audio visual equipment in the church sanctuary.

*The Guild:* This fund comprises the transactions undertaken by The Guild.

*Library Fund:* This is a fund to provide books for lending to the congregation

*Choir Fund:* A fund to provide music to enhance services

*Printing & Publications Fund:* This is a fund set up to cover the costs of the church publications

*Youth Development Fund:* This is the operational fund of the youth development team and it is to assist the youth of the church.

*Elderly Care Fund:* Set up for the benefit and welfare of elderly people associated with the congregation

*Windows Old Hall:* Opened to collect funds to renew windows in the Old Hall.

**5 Trustee Remuneration and Related Party Transactions**

**6 Minister's Stipend**

All Church of Scotland congregations contribute to the National Stipend Fund which bears the costs of all ministers' stipends and employer's contributions for national insurance, pension and housing and loan fund. Stipends are paid in accordance with the national stipend scale, which is related to years of service. For the year under review, the minimum stipend was £30,135 and the maximum stipend (in the fifth and subsequent years) was £37,032.
