Structure, Governance and Management

Constitution

The Charity is an unincorporated association registered on 16 January 2009 and governed by a constitution.

Recruitment and appointment of Trustees

At each annual general meeting, the members may elect any member to be a member of the management committee, which form the Trustees of the charity. The management committee may at any time appoint any member to be a member of the management committee. At each annual general meeting, all of the members of the management committee shall retire from office - but shall then be eligible for re-election.

Objectives and Activities

Charitable purposes

The charity's object is to provide a national support network for children with arthritis (and associated conditions) and their families through the provision of factual, practical and emotional support. It aims to pull together the wider community of affected children in Scotland as well as raise public awareness of childhood arthritis.

The charitable purposes are:

- the advancement of education,
- the provision of recreational facilities, or the organisation of recreational activities, with the object of improving the conditions of life for the persons for whom the facilities or activities are primarily intended, and
- the relief of those in need by reason of age, ill-health, disability, financial hardship or other disadvantage.

Achievements

Chair's Report: an overview of the activities and achievements of the charity:

The Scottish Network for Arthritis in Children (SNAC) was started in 2008. Although parent volunteers / committee members have changed over the years, the aims of the charity remain the same:

- to provide factual, practical, and emotional support to children and their families affected by Juvenile Idiopathic Arthritis (JIA) and,
- to raise & maintain awareness of the condition and its impact on children affected.

There are currently 638 active family memberships on the register, equating to 1925 individual members.

SNAC (SCIO) is lucky to have a fabulous group of volunteer parents who juggle supporting the charity with work, study commitments, homelife and carer roles for both their own children and often parents. Without the precious time and energy from our volunteer parents, SNAC could not continue to support families in Scotland affected by JIA. I would like to formally thank everyone for their ongoing commitment, organisation skills, positivity & time.

Key roles of the committee, though not exhaustive, include distribution of welcome packs and overseeing the merchandise platform, 'buzzies' distribution, administrative duties to comply with charity governance and overseeing closed FB groups and membership requests, attendance at various groups e.g., SPARN, Cross parliamentary Musco-skeletal group, organising and hosting local and national events for families to attend and network, providing a link to medical staff and other charitable organisations, website maintenance, and administration of

Committee meetings remain online, which aids attendance, note taking and cost effective and more time efficient. However, in past the committee have valued the face-to-face time they had had during family weekends which from a team-building point of view, allowed more natural conversation and strengthens relationships for working together. We aim to hold our future AGMs with added strategy workshop to our parent's information day in March 2025 to facilitate close working and agree events moving forwards.

Transfer to SCIO by Nov 2024

Under the guidance of our treasure and founding member and Trustee SNAC successfully transferred from being a registered charity to a Scottish Charity Incorporated Organisation (SCIO). This means that SNAC (SCIO) is a recognised legal entity, separate from the volunteers who run it with tightened governance around our processes and liability. We remain regulated by OSCR (Scottish Charity Regulator). This has been a huge piece of work with various conditions to satisfy and we extend a huge thanks to for navigating the journey within key deadlines

Overview of Activities since last reporting period (Oct 2023 – Oct 2024)

SNAC ended 2023 with a "National Cinema Event" and booked out an Odeon in Edinburgh, Dundee and Glasgow along with a Cineworld in Aberdeen for the same date in November. Over 200 members attended sporting purple t-shirts, to watch Disney's newest release, WISH with snacks and drinks. This was very well received by families and highlights the need to support more local events to allow parents to chat and network. Some newly diagnosed families were delighted and somewhat overwhelmed to see so many families together and the emotional response highlights the value SNAC can add to a family's experience of living with JIA. We successfully raised awareness with a few enquiries about collection tins and were able to signpost a non-member passerby to our website to access info for their newly diagnosed daughter.

We ended the year with promotion of the SNAC virtual Christmas card to raise some funds and asked the community to flood the closed FB group with Christmas jumper photos on the 7th of December!

January 2024

The Trustees & office bearers (secretary, treasurer and then acting chair) met in Glasgow for an away day to discuss the risks and benefits and necessary steps for SNAC to become a SCIO. This was a valuable strategy day and provided the space for more prolonged discussion which is often a challenge during evening committee meetings.

Blair Drummond Family Day – 15th Sept 2024

An amazing grant of £14,000 from the National Lottery's Awards for All programme enabled a national family fun day at Blair Drummond Safari Park on the 15th of September, open to all SNAC members. Buses with various pick-ups on route, were run from Ayr, Aberdeen, Glasgow and the Lothians enabling 400 people to attend a fantastic day with lunch, snacks, workshops by the Teapot Trust and animal antics! Children with JIA can often feel alone and isolated with their condition and parents and carers need support. The event was a huge success, allowing children and their siblings to hook up with old and make new friends, share useful information and tips for coping with JIA and generally have a great time. Feedback was overwhelmingly positive, reinforcing the need for these events and making all the organisation behind the scenes truly worthwhile. A massive thanks to who not only secured the grant, but coordinated the whole event and volunteer tasks.

Aimee's Fund

In 2023/24 SNAC received 3 Aimee's Fund grant applications for a course of swimming lessons, a term of horse riding and a bike (2 from health professionals at RHSC Edinburgh and 1 from Glasgow). This is down on previous years and will be mentioned again at the Scottish Paediatric Arthritis Network meeting to highlight to healthcare professionals that the fund is there and what it can cover.

Buzzy Devices

These remain popular and requested either individually by families or by the Rheumatology Nurses for distributing. Thank you to Rheumatology Nurses and patients.

Welcome packs

These continue to be distributed to newly diagnosed children – thank you to the extende family who send all packs from Arran! We have added to the packs this year and they are now sent out in cardboard instead of plastic envelopes in the interests of the environment.

Online Shop

Massive thanks to ______ for setting up a new online shop for SNAC. Previously, members were able to purchase merchandise from eBay and volunteers would parcel up the goods for posting out. This was becoming untenable from both a storage and time commitment point of view. Members can now buy SNAC badged products from https://personalised.clothing/snac and have them sent out directly which reduces postage costs for the charity and has provided the opportunity for new lines of merchandise – see the addition of the SNAC Reindeer in time for Christmas 2024!

Joint Working

Committee members have also been representing SNAC at the Arthritis and Muskuloskeletal Cross-party meetings at Scottish parliament, a children's mental health panel, providing letters of support for conference hosting bids & some research initiatives. We continue to engage with secondary school aged children in their Youth Philanthropy Initiative work.

SNAC committee members have been continuing to link in with teams from the Teapot Trust and Versus Arthritis to see what events we could help with, or where our members could help inform their work. We were delighted that Teapot Trust ran workshops at our Blair Drummond event and are collaborating with VA colleagues for our planned parent's information day in March 2025.

We continue to provide the parent and child's perspective to the SPARN (Scottish Network for Arthritis in Children) and represent SNAC in collaborating with healthcare professionals on workstreams such as Guidelines and Quality Indicators, presenting at their education day in June 2024 and liaising with the clinical teams for support for our information days and families weekend planned for 2025.

Social media & website

SNAC continues to manage accounts in Instagram, Twitter and most actively, Facebook. There is a Facebook page (1.9k followers) and two Facebook groups, one specifically for parents and carers (closed group, 677 members)).

The website continues to be improved and updated. It is a good way of giving accurate information to families and is updated regularly with news items. All credit to continuing to support the committee with this and a formal thank you to SNAC member who has come forward to offer his extensive experience in this area.

Fundraising

A simple but massive "Thank you" to all fundraisers! SNAC could not continue to carry out our aims to support families or run events without such a fantastic and generous community of supporters. Full details are in the Treasurer's report, and we continue to give shout-outs to fundraisers on the FB group.

Moving forward into 2025

Already in the diary is a Parent's information day on 15th March in Dundee, where healthcare professionals will provide information to parents / carers with newly diagnosed children and those with teenagers and adolescents transitioning into adult services. A family weekend is planned for Sept 4-6th and this will be aimed at families who have never attended a weekend before and / or are needing some support. We look forward to more local events in the new year and in the meantime the SNAC elves are working on a Christmas newsletter for all members!

With the dissolution of SNAC as a charity and transfer of assets to SNAC (SCIO), we move forward in a stronger position with all current committee members agreeing to become Trustees. Although buoyant in numbers, the committee can only take on SNAC activities with the continued support of volunteers. There will need to be a focus on contingency and resilience in 2025 to ensure succession planning, particularly of the office bearer roles given that current holders approach the 3-year mark in post.

Financial review

Total receipts for the year were £58,212 (2023: £37,418). Payments in the year amounted to £34,480 (2023: £45,375). This resulted in net surplus for the year of £23,732 (2023: net deficit of £7,957). Funds represented by deposits held in the SCIO's bank accounts at 31 October 2024 were £114,045 (2023: £90,313) all of which were unrestricted.

Trustee remuneration and expenses

Trustees were reimbursed for travel expense on behalf of the charity of £941 (2023: £1,324).

Reserves

The charity has a savings account holding an amounts considered to be the reserves of the charity. This is considered necessary to fund the events for a period of time if fundraising levels dropped. As at 31 October 2024, this was £52,000 which is roughly in line with one year's expenditure.

Major risks facing the charity

SNAC is a volunteer led charity and no payment is made to the committee members, other than any travel costs. Being able run events, post out welcome packs, attend meetings and maintain the website and social media etc takes time. SNAC relies on a parents / carers coming forward to help and with other life and work commitments this is not always guaranteed. The committee are exploring more routes to enable parents to help in a more manageable way.

Local events and in particular the larger Scotland wide event have become more costsly to run over the last few years as businesses pass on their increased costs to service users. These costs are met via fundraising and although we are lucky to have an engaged membership who help with this, the committee are keen to explore the possibility of grants to assist with some of the bigger events to enable inclusion of more families.

Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of Scottish Network for Arthritis in Children

I report on the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31 October 2024, which are set out on pages 10 and 11 and the related notes on pages 12 to 14.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's Trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006(as amended) ("the 2006 Regulations"). The charity Trustees consider that the audit requirement of Regulation 10(1) (d) of the Regulations does not apply. It is my responsibility to examine the accounts as required under section 44(1) (c) of the Act and to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of independent examiner's statement

My examination is carried out in accordance with Regulation 11 of the 2006 Regulations. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeks explanations from the Trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the view given by the accounts.

1. Accounting policies

Basis of accounting

The accounts have been prepared on the Receipts and Payments basis in accordance with the Charities & Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended).

VAT

The charity is not registered for VAT and, accordingly, expenditure includes VAT where appropriate.

Resources expended

Payments for fundraising activities comprises those costs incurred by the charity in raising funds for the charity and selling charity merchandise.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the Independent Examiner's fee.

Nature and purpose of funds

Unrestricted funds are those that may be used at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the objects of the charity.

Restricted funds may only be used for specific purposes. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for specific purposes. During the year the charity received funding from the National Lottery Community Fund Scotland to deliver a trip to Blair Drummond.

2. Payments to Trustees

Trustees were reimbursed for travel expenses when in charity duties, this amounted to a total of £941 (2023: £1,324).
