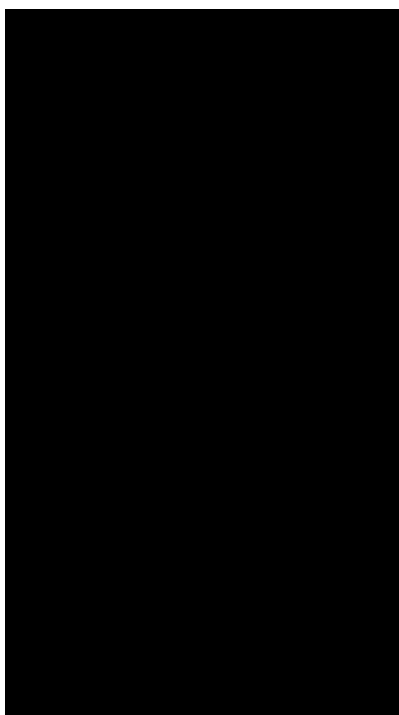

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Current Trustees



Structure, Governance and Management

Constitution

The Charity is a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (a SCIO). It was registered in its current legal form on 23 June 2016. It has a single tier structure and as such the trustees are the members of the charity.

Appointment of trustees

The management committee, which normally meets on a six-weekly basis, are the charity's trustees. Membership of the management committee is open to all members of the organisation.

Trustees are elected at the annual general meeting, which is usually held in September. There must be a minimum of five and a maximum of thirteen trustees.

Objectives and Activities

Charitable purposes

The organisation's purposes are to:

Promote equal opportunity in sport, by encouraging participation in a range of activities by under-represented groups, from Black / minority ethnic (BME) communities, and women and girls by challenging and tackling inequality, racism and discrimination in the field of sport.

Encourage ethnic minority communities of all ages and all protected characteristics to participate in sport, recreation and play by providing culturally sensitive sport facilities.

Encourage ethnic minority communities of all ages and all protected characteristics to achieve levels of fitness, to develop sports skills and have healthy lifestyle by organising appropriate provision of sport, recreation and play.

Promote sporting activities for ethnic minority and women and girls by organising appropriate games, competitions and events.

Achievements and Performance

SEMSA undertakes a range of activities that promote, encourage and allow activities for members of BME and women and girl to participate in sport, recreation and community cohesion.

One of our flagship projects, our on-going commitment around the United Kingdom Asian Football Championships, has been interrupted during COVID pandemic. We hope to resume this flagship and extremely successful event in the foreseeable future to keep the cross- fertilisation of skill and ability throughout the UK.

SEMSA has been running children sporting events at the Kelvin Hall and outdoors at the Kelvingrove Park, with wider participation from the BAME community. Sessions on football and badminton, tug of war, archery and other participatory sports are regular feature. Impact of these sporting events are major. This year's summer event has been affected by organising PVG certification, which is still in progress.

Noteworthy progress with longer-term sustainability has been achieved with a very strong leadership by a trustee in the fields of Badminton and Cricket. Sessions, which allow women and girls to participate in sport in surroundings conducive to their specific needs are highly successful and flagship activity of SEMSA. Ladies cricket organised Bolly Cricket and training sessions with support from Cricket Scotland. Sessions were run during the month of May at Hunters hill Sports Centre, Bishopbriggs.

Women's Community badminton Tournament was held this year on 22 June 2025. This ethnically diverse women only tournament is a first of its kind in Scotland and has been ongoing since 2017. This year ladies travelled from Isle of Skye, Dundee, Ayrshire, Perthshire and Glasgow as participants and VIP guests.

SEMSA Badminton tournament was held at the Sir Craig Badminton Centre for men, women an extra category of over 50s. This initiative is going from strength to strength in the leadership of two SEMSA trustees putting their effort, running competitive as well social club structure. Membership spans from Scotland, England, India, Pakistan, Sri Lanka, Bangladesh, China, Spain, Greece, Barbados, Nigeria and Australia. This club was set up in 1989.

SEMSA also maintained their effort into special event to mark International Women's Day (IWD) March, following on from previous traditions. This initiative has very wide audience and attended by local dignitaries. Women from wider spectrum of community are invited to share their experiences and empower as well as inspire them as role models. VIP guests included [REDACTED] and various other role models from varied fields. SEMSA IWD is unique in being inclusive and endeavour removing isolation of BAME women.

Now regular and popular SEMSA Awards Ceremony is held annually to recognise volunteers and trendsetters from BAME community in an appropriate manner in the presence of local dignitaries from sporting field as well as wider population. Our women award winners have gone onto be part of national cricket teams and badminton teams. SEMSA Award is run by the community and for the community.

The Glasgow Life, Club Sport Glasgow, Glasgow City Council and all the sporting agencies are very supportive of SEMSA and their needs. Club Sport Glasgow has been supportive of SEMSA all throughout its existence by funding our activities through Sports Promotion Grants, General Grants and Club of the year Awards. Additionally, they advise us on various strategic issues due to their vast knowledge and experience in the sector.

SEMSA also encourages [health and wellbeing](#) ethos through active life and physical exercises as well as outdoor activities, such as hill walking, 5K, 10K and other such regular initiatives. This area has picked up great momentum lead by a trustee. Trips have been arranged to Aberfoyle, Kilpatrick Hills, Wangi Hills, Pentlands Hill and many other locations.

Overall, we believe we are meeting our core objectives by making additional efforts to encourage even more BME people to get involved in sport, thereby improving their health, wellbeing and fitness. SEMSA is challenging and tackling under-representation and inequality. In a nutshell, it also improves their physical as well as mental wellbeing, and some cases of raising the level of sporting ability to next higher level.

This year SEMSA has been awarded with Impact Award for their charitable work, which is an important achievement.

Financial review

Our main source of funding continues to be from grants and donations, including from Glasgow City Council) Area Partnership)/National Lottery/ North Lanarkshire Council/ Glasgow Life / Glasgow Sport. Sponsorship and registration dues from teams competing in the Badminton, Cricket, IWD and other activities is another major source of income. It is recognised that additional effort needs to be made to secure additional income to allow for more activities to be organised in order to better meet our main objectives. Financial report supports the fact that we are committed to charitable work as our spending and earning almost balance out.

Reserves policy

The trustees' policy is to eventually build up reserves so that at least 3 months' worth of normal running costs is retained in order to meet commitments and to cover any unexpected expenditure. The trustees believe that this should be possible in the next year or so and will continue to monitor the position.

Plans for future period

The trustees intend to continue to build up the funding base and expand the work of the organisation. Plans for our regular activities (the UKAFC, badminton, football, 5K and 10K events, Hill Walking, International Women's Day, junior and senior football, children's sports day) will continue, with discussions and plans in place about expanding the range of activities to be more inclusive with neurodiverse children and disability sport.

As mentioned above, the annual Scottish Ethnic Minority Sports Awards, designed to recognize and celebrate the contributions made by Black / minority ethnic communities within the sporting arena have now become an annual highlight of our activity.

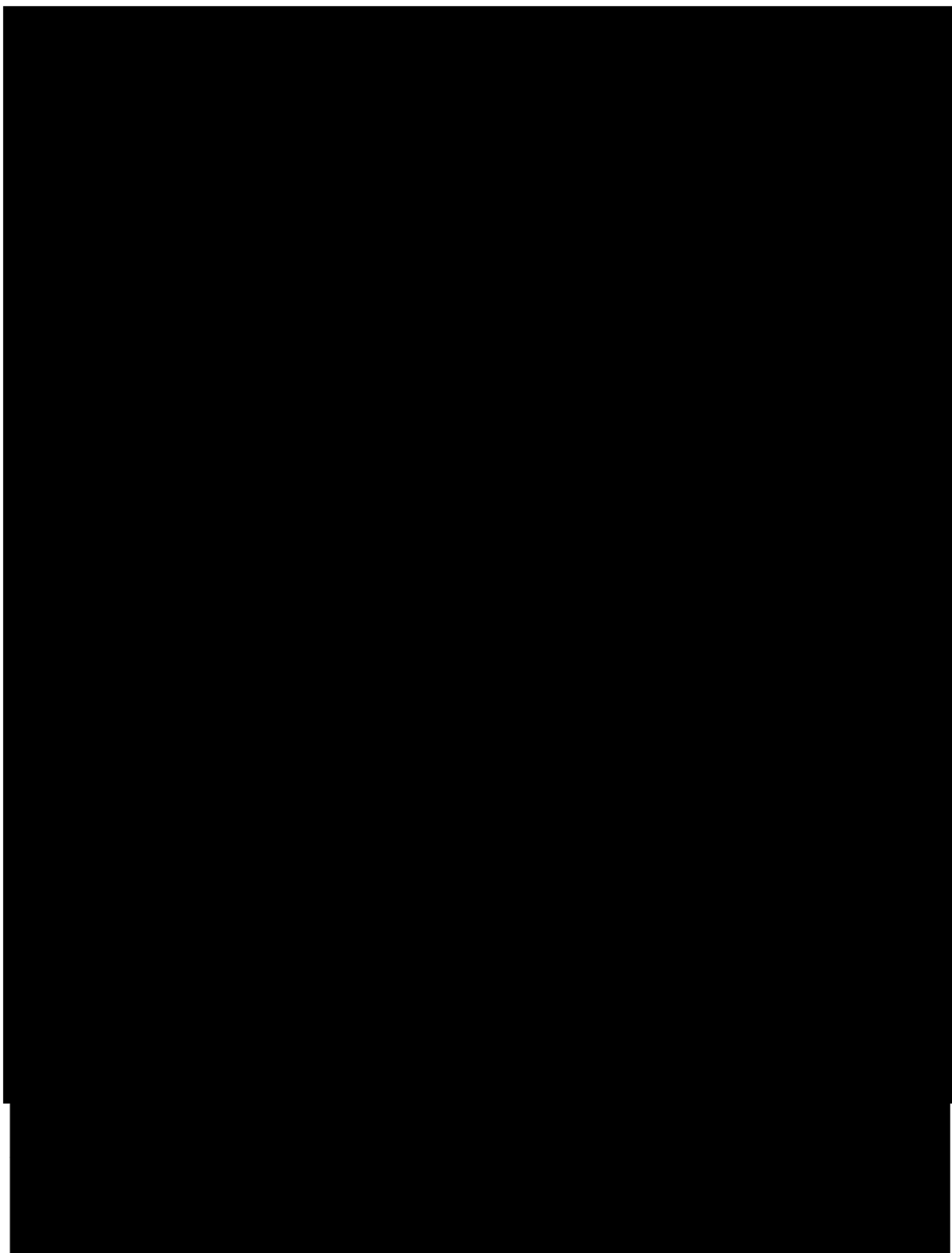
Also, SEMSA have received funding from the EMDF communities Award and Area Partnership Funds, which will be used to start Football Initiative for children as well as adults, with specialist professional coaching to help them obtain the highest standard of training. The planning has already been complete and we away PVG certification of the individuals involved to be certified for children and vulnerable engaged in regulatory work.

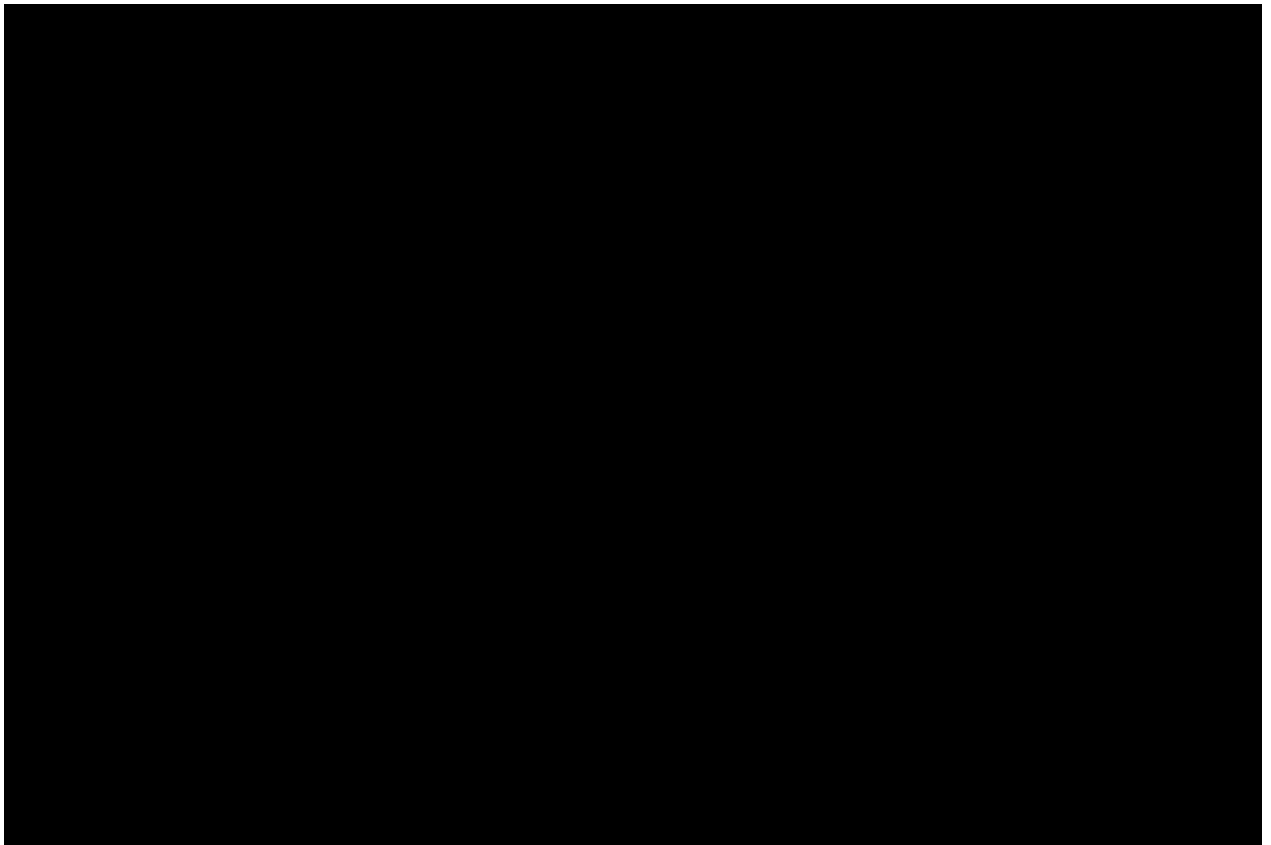

Basis of independent examiner's statement

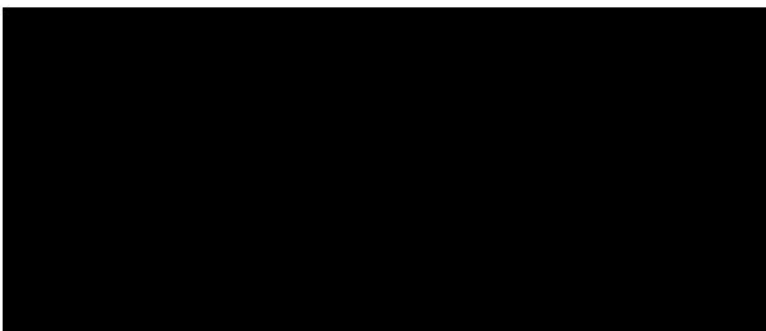
