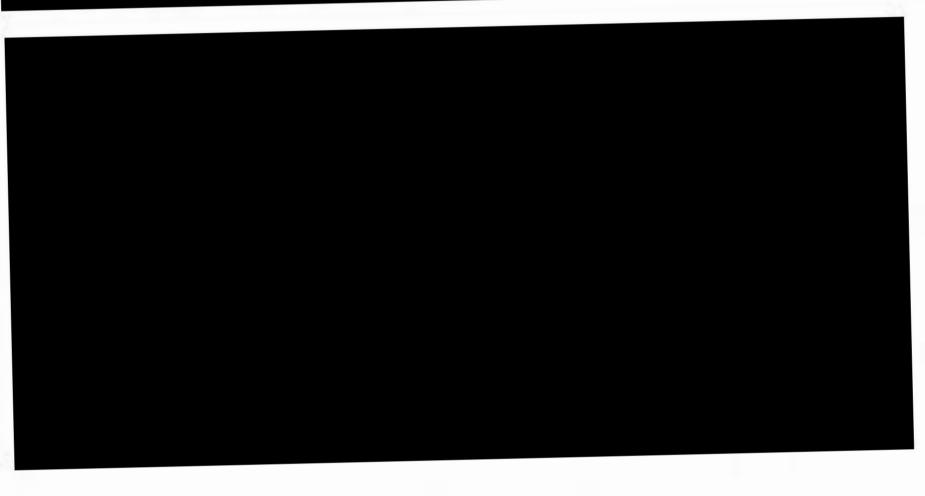

#### Year ended 31 December 2023

I report on the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2023 set out on pages 1 to 8.

#### Year ended 31 December 2023

#### 1. General information

The charity is a public benefit entity and a registered charity in Scotland and is unincorporated. The address of the principal office is

#### 2. Accounting policies

#### Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the Receipts and Payments basis in accordance with the Charities & Trustees Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended).

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

#### Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

#### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purposes.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular future project or commitment.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal, and fall into one of two sub-classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

## Notes to the Financial Statements (continued)

## Year ended 31 December 2023

## Accounting policies (continued)

#### Receipts

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity; it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.
- legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable and entitlement is established.
- income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this is impractical to measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost to the donor or the estimated resale value. Donated facilities and services are recognised in the accounts when received if the value can be reliably measured. No amounts are included for the contribution of general volunteers.
- income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual . requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case it may be regarded as restricted.

#### **Payments**

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, non-charitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods.
- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable activities.
- other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

## Trustee remuneration and expenses

As permitted in section 5.1 of the Constitution, wages were paid to one charity trustee who is employed as a senior member of staff leading the activities for adults with learning disabilities or mental health issues. £14,215 (2022: £8,701) was paid to

We work with other community groups, charities and local businesses to help improve our local area and create better community ties and a wider range of experiences for our service users helping build confidence in a friendly inclusive environment.

We provide an evening group focused on music, we sing karaoke and learn to sign along to music using Makaton and BSL. We get a chance to perform in the community at least twice a year.

We provide a day group, where sessions are focused on woodwork projects, crafting, gardening, games and much more. We try to ensure the service is led by the service users by allowing choices in how our group is run and which activities we undertake while ensuring each activity is tailored to their individual needs. We work alongside other community groups, charities and businesses to help further community ties and help with the inclusion of our service users...

#### **APPENDIX 1**

## Achievements and performance

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the financial period

We provide a day service where we offer all manner of activities for our guys. These range from woodworking projects such as building planters, making toys, bird/fairy houses, bird feeders and garden decorations Our guys are supported to use tools and be as involved in the process as much as possible. We have donated garden decorations and bird feeders to Buckie community Hub, Millbank school Bothy, alba road residential service, We provide lots of craft projects ranging from making teddy bears to creating cards, we try to ensure our service users choices so they can lead the activities. We adapt each activity to each individuals needs allowing them the opportunity to learn new skills in a positive and caring environment.

We have continued work on the community fairy garden at the Buckpool harbour. We have been maintaining the decorations and adding to the garden through the year. We provided bunny and chick decorations for an Easter egg hunt to the Buckpool harbour community group. Our guys contributed to a beach/park clean in the area too. Our fairy garden was extended by the kids at Millbank primary school who we had a session with. Building great community connections being involved with the Loch Park music festival, performing at Gordon Castle Games, the Buckie Christmas Kracker and having regular visitors such as the childsmile and oral health team from NHS Scotland who are helping us with dental care. We have had regular visits from bunnetz and beardz a local music group who provide entertainment for the guys along with enjoyed music from Buckie Lyrical choir.

Our evening sessions are music based, we sing karaoke and sign along to music using Makaton and BSL, we have secured three regular shows to perform in public, we also host discos for the service users. These sessions are a great confidence builder and allows vulnerable adults to have fun and socialise in a supported setting.
