
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Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 August 2024

The Trustees are pleased to present their report together with the financial statements of the church for the year ended 31 August 2024.

Status of Charity and governing document

Ladywell Baptist Church - Livingston was established by constitution and registered as a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (SCIO) – Charity No: (SC050304) with the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator on the 20th July 2020, and consent was given to wind up/dissolve Livingston Baptist Church – Ladywell Congregation (SC018932) on 25th November 2020. All assets were duly transferred from the Unincorporated Voluntary Association to the SCIO on 4th March 2021.

Aims and affiliation

The aims of the church are in line with its Mission Statement - The making and maturing of disciples of Jesus Christ in the power of the Holy Spirit to the glory of God. The church is affiliated to the Baptist Union of Scotland. The aims also include the advancement of education, along with the relief of poverty and other social needs, including the support of individuals and other charitable organisations and agencies involved in any or all of these.

Trustees and Office Bearers

The church is congregational in policy and its day to day running is undertaken by the Deacons Court (the Trustees). The Deacons Court who served during the year were as follows:



Appointment of Trustees

There is no fixed term for Trusteeship but initially all Trustees have to be appointed as a deacon. Deacons are elected on a three year rolling basis. Prior to their appointment, new Trustees would have served the church for some time in various roles and would be familiar with the church's values, its aims and objectives as well as its day-to-day operations. As part of their induction programme, new Trustees are required to understand their statutory responsibilities.

Achievements and performance

Worship

During the 2023-2024 accounting year we were very fortunate to celebrate 6 baptisms and be joined by 10 new members. In response to this growing number of new people we started running Hope Explored and Christianity Explored.

Our Community and a Youth and Children's Workers (both part-time), facilitate the running of our current programs and develop new areas of ministry in the church and the local community.

Achievements and performance(continued)

Youth and Children's Work

In addition to our regular creche, Sunday school and youth fellowship, all with a good number of children and young people participating. We also ran an annual holiday club (this year over 75 children attended) and a weekly children's club called BLAST (a building block from holiday club) on Tuesday evening attended by around 40, mainly local, children.

We also run a weekly parent and toddler group, which was relaunched this year under the new name, Little Lights. Over the past year we started a weekly after school club in Mid Calder Primary School, Ignite.

Community work

We continued to run the Ladywell Community Fridge from our church building every Friday, feeding around 120 people weekly. It provided an essential support to local families who were struggling with the rising cost of living. In the spring of 2024, we changed the format from a general food bank to a Friday Community Café, offering a warm space with a soup & sandwich lunch, the food bank element being greatly reduced.

We partnered with Bethany Christian Trust's Caring Christmas Trees, serving as the Livingston site, each year raising money to support work among Scotland's homeless people.

Future plans

Balancing our desire to build up and strengthen the church and reach out to the local community over the next year we plan to continue with our current work and hope to expand.

- Create more pathways for local residents and families to connect with our church through low cost or free activities in order to increase spiritual and mental wellbeing, increase social connections and bring hope. The site next door to us has recently had plans for new flats approved. We see this as a great opportunity to connect with residents right on our doorstep.
- Develop and train volunteers in order to increase what we currently offer.
- Strengthening relationships with local schools and offering increased provision. We have already established an after-school group in Mid Calder primary and we are in talks to offer a similar group at Toronto Primary. We have also recently had groups come from Harrysmuir Primary to visit the church as part of their RME and we will offer this to more schools.
- Increasing discipleship opportunities such as Discipleship Explored, Life Explored and Hope Explored.
- Widen Christian partnerships, for example partner with Scripture Union (to start SU groups and deliver Bible Alive locally) and work with Livingston Ecumenical Parish to offer approved schools programmes such as 'Bubblegum and Fluff' and 'Easter Code' to local schools as part of their religious observance.

Financial review

Principal sources of funding

The church receives its funding from church members by way of weekly offerings and Gift Aid donations.

Results for the year

The financial statements for the year are set out in pages 4 to 7. The Receipts and Payments Account on page 4 reflects a surplus of £7,047 (2023:deficit of £3,072).

Reserves

It is the policy of the church to maintain unrestricted funds, i.e. funds not committed or invested in fixed assets, at a level which equates to approximately three months unrestricted expenditure. This allows sufficient funds to enable the ongoing work of the church to be maintained. The General Fund (page 4) at 31 August 2024 amounted to unrestricted funds of £17,888 (2023: £9,199) and was less than the required level but the trustees are working to increase general reserves.

Total reserves, including balances on restricted funds, amounted to £21,086 (2023: £14,039).

Grant making policy

The church makes grants from its gift income to individuals and organisations that are generally known to the Trustees and the church (see note 4 to the accounts). The beneficiaries are involved in activities or ministries compatible with the church's objectives.

Report of the Independent Examiner to the Trustees for the year ended 31 August 2024

I report on the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31 August 2024 which are set out on pages 4 to 7.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended). The charity trustees consider that the audit requirement of Regulation 10(1) (d) of the Accounts Regulations does not apply. It is my responsibility to examine the accounts as required under section 44(1) (c) of the Act and to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of independent examiner's statement

My examination is carried out in accordance with Regulation 11 of the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended). An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts and seeks explanations from the trustees concerning such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the view given by the accounts.

Notes to the Receipts and Payments Accounts

For the year ended 31 August 2024

1. Accounting policies

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended).

Basis of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared on a receipts and payments basis.

Receipts and payments account

For the purpose of the Receipts and Payments Account as shown on page 4, funds are defined as follows:

Unrestricted funds: comprise grants and other income received for the objects of the church without further specified purpose and are available as general funds.

Designated fund: represent unrestricted funds which have been earmarked by the Trustees for particular purposes.

Restricted funds: comprise income which has been received for the objects of the church and specified for a restricted purpose within these objects by the donor.

2. Transactions with Trustees

Trustee in the year were £36,860 (2023: £36,703) and pension payments were £4,860 (2023: £2,190) in relation to his position as Pastor. Salary payments to Trustee in the year were £7,089 (2023: £2,834) and pension payments were £183.40 (2023: £22.64) in relation to his position as a community worker. No other Trustee received remuneration during the year (2023: none). They also received expenses of £4,840 in the year (2023: £4,266) and other Trustees received reimbursed expenses totaling £169 (2023: £519).
