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CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2024

I learnt about Go Girvan from some of the members and decided the group sounded really interesting and joined just before the last AGM. At the meeting I became a trustee as I felt I could offer my help to get their ideas and plans happening, as I want Girvan to be the thriving town it used to be when I came to live here in 1993.

I am not born and bred in Girvan - I came here to make it my home and 32 years later this is where I belong. I have worked in retail, factory and now hospitality. It's been said to me I am an outsider as I was not born in Girvan but that just makes me more determined to do more.

I feel we, as a community and town, could offer so much more to our people and visitors. We have beautiful surroundings, attractions, the beach and harbour but once in the town is where we let everyone down.

32 years ago, in the summer months it was full of visitors. I worked in retail and we were really busy, there were plenty of shops, cafés, pubs and a cinema - now there is hardly any of the above. We had hotels that could be used as venues for occasions, weddings and parties - now barely anywhere to offer this.

This is where Go Girvan can hopefully make changes to get the sparkle back into Girvan, with the help of our incredible funders, our hard-working trustees, members and volunteers, our brilliant Development Officer, and the backing of the community.

We aim to work along with other community groups in Girvan and with us all pulling together we hopefully will achieve our goals.

Girvan is still a great wee town but needs so much more!



REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2024

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2024. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

Our Charitable Purposes:

- Community development and
- The advancement of arts, culture, heritage and science.

Our beneficiaries are the communities of Girvan, the wider KA26 area (predominantly) and incorporating the South Carrick district.

Our Vision:

To enable Girvan to become a thriving town full of culture, activity, shopping, dining: a bustling attractive place to live in and to visit, a place that embraces and celebrates its culture and heritage while always looking to the future.

Our Aims:

- To promote Girvan as a vibrant town with a strong sense of community and to build positive perceptions of Girvan (both digitally and in person) to the wider community and to visitors to the town through the preservation, conservation and protection of the natural and cultural environment.
- To provide, maintain and manage facilities which can be used for recreational, heritage, and cultural pursuits in order to improve the wellbeing of the community of Girvan and the general public.
- To build and maintain partnerships between community groups, voluntary organisations, and public sector bodies to sustainably shape Girvan's tourism offerings and opportunities.

In order to achieve our aims we must:

- Position Go Girvan as an organisation with the ability, authority and support to become a main driver to achieve our vision for Girvan
- Promote Girvan and its surrounds to as wide an audience as possible to raise its importance and give it presence
- Help drive the regeneration of culture, retail and hospitality in Girvan.

We work by including and supporting the community and by involving other local groups, key public sector bodies and third-party organisations to help us to realise our vision and achieve our aims.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2024

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Significant activities

The end of February saw the completion of the Ailsa Craig Popup Exhibition project, funded by ARIA. Comprising a series of interpretation boards covering topics such as geology, wildlife and a history of the island. A great educational exhibition that can popup at any event or venue for the benefit of the community.

In June 2024, Go Girvan organised and hosted the third Girvan Tattie Fest. This had been one of the original projects started by Go Girvan in 2022 and tasked by Destination South Ayrshire (one of our funders) to grow over a five-year period. In 2024, the festival (which had previously mainly taken place within the Girvan Community Garden) escaped onto the old putting green and the beach and added a parade through the town. The festival celebrates the traditional harvest time of the Ayrshire Epicure Earlies, grown in farms around the town. It is a community festival held at a time when Girvan has many visitors. In 2024, it became more than just a celebration of tatties, it became a coming together of local community groups putting on a festival for the community, its surrounding areas, and its visitors. This popular event attracted almost 1,000 attendees.

In August, we took part in the RNLI's Harbour Gala and signed up new volunteers including one who works for a company that promotes employer-supported volunteering - this relationship would result in hundreds of pounds of donations in 2025.

We also became involved with the Galloway & Southern Ayrshire UNESCO Biosphere. Following our enrolment as a Proud Supporter, we organised several events to introduce local businesses to the Biosphere to enable them to take advantage of working towards Proud Supporter status for their businesses. Several businesses signed up and some of them have gone on to achieve recognition with the Biosphere Certification Mark.

In September, following a comprehensive recruitment campaign, Go Girvan became an employer for the first time, taking on a new Development Officer to help the Board develop its strategic plan for the future.

In November, we completed a project that had been open for a number of years. Originally called the Girvan Heritage Trail, it was to be a discrete trail around Girvan highlighting and depicting iconic places and hidden gems around the town. However, it was very similar to a project being run by the Girvan Town Team. The two groups decided to combine projects and develop one trail. The trail now combines 10 beautiful plinths of decorated cast iron, each with its own interpretation board describing the location in which it stands.

December saw a new event added to our portfolio - a traditional Christmas Market with a twist. The purpose of this was to attract visitors and locals into the town so that our local businesses could benefit from the increased footfall. We organised a large marquee at Stumpy corner to house stalls selling Christmas Fayre, a choir singing traditional Christmas carols, mulled wine, warm mince pies, tombola and raffles. About 50% of the shops in Girvan agreed to remain open on the late afternoon and evening of the market and we promoted these shops through posters, social media, and signage. Unfortunately, Storm Darragh damaged the large marquee making it unusable. However, with the help of other local community groups and volunteers, we were able to set the market up at The Wave in Girvan. Many stall holders couldn't come as the police had warned how dangerous travel was. However, we still went ahead with a handful of local stallholders, the choir, tombola, mulled drinks, and mince pies. About 400 people braved the weather and attended the event. The shops around The Wave reported increased footfall and takings because of the event and everyone we spoke to asked for the event to be held again in 2025 - hopefully, without the storm!

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE Charitable activities Our achievements in 2024:

2024 was an interesting year for Go Girvan - it started as a year of consolidation but became a year of enormous change.

When Go Girvan was first formed (even before it became a SCIO), it had the remit to implement a series of projects within Girvan that would support and build back the town's tourism industry which had been so devastated by the impact of the COVID pandemic. It had spent 2022 and 2023 working through the list of projects, and the early part of 2024 saw the completion of this list. However, as this work was coming to an end, the Board of Go Girvan had to decide on what was to happen next.

The Board and our Development Officer worked, during the second half of 2024, to develop a strategic plan to take the organisation forwards. This was a difficult and lengthy process as the future of Go Girvan was seen differently by different people. However, by the end of November 2024, the new strategic plan was agreed and the management of Go Girvan moved forward on its implementation. Go Girvan would become a more community - focussed organisation with an emphasis on benefitting the local community and attracting visitors to the town.

For the majority of 2024, it was a period of consolidation: finishing projects that had been open since 2023, completing a final evaluation report, growing existing events into more well-rounded, community occasions, building relationships with other local community groups and key organisations, and developing the infrastructure of Go Girvan to be better placed to implement its new strategy.

Go Girvan ended 2024 in a strong place - with a cohesive and well-rounded management board and the drive and commitment to really move forward in 2025.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The charity received grant funding from the following sources during the year:

Ayrshire Rural and Islands Ambition (ARIA) Fund £1,883 as the final instalment for the Ailsa Craig Popup.

South Ayrshire Council - Community Empowerment Fund £889 for the Girvan Tattie Fest.

Awards for All £9,700 for the Girvan Tattie Fest.

Nestle £200 for the Bunting Project.

SURF - Scotland's Regeneration Forum £500 for the provision of a laptop for the new development officer.

Investment policy and objectives

The Trustees have the power to invest in such assets as they see fit.

Reserves policy

It is the Trustees' policy to hold reserves to meet future expenditure. At the year end the charity held unrestricted reserves of £8,095.

The charity also held restricted reserves of £27,094 which have been provided for specific purposes. There is a breakdown of these funds in note 9 of these financial statements.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

Critical accounting judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

Changes in accounting policies

This is the first year that accounts have been prepared on the accruals basis. This had no material impact on the prior year's accounts.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Plant and machinery - 25% on cost

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charity's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

Donated goods

Donated goods are recognised as income when the charity has control over the item, any conditions associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use by the charity of the item is probable and the economic benefit can be measured reliably.

Financial instruments

The organisation only has financial assets and liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.
