Bowden and Melrose Church of Scotland Trustees' Report Year ended 31 December 2023

The trustees present their annual report and financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2023. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the General Assembly Regulations for Congregational Finance, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended) and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland published on 16 July 2014 and revised in October 2019.

Objectives and Activities

The local congregation seeks to fulfil its responsibilities as a parish church in offering pastoral care within the community and providing a variety of services of worship in our two churches. In addition services are held in other locations and a large number of congregational and community activities take place in the church premises. It is also fundamental that members of the congregation are involved in many ways in the life of the community. The congregation is also committed to supporting the wider work of the Church.

Achievements and Performance

- Worship

We met for worship each Sunday at 9.30am in Bowden Kirk and 11.00am in Melrose Church most ably accompanied by our organists and a small but dedicated choir in Melrose.

Timing is always an issue for our outreach to families. Sunday mornings tend to be busy. So, during the summer it was decided to merge our monthly Family Service with Messy Church. Messy Church now meets monthly on the second Sunday of the month, 3.00-5.00pm, was well supported throughout the year and much enjoyed by both the families and our 'Messy Team'.

Holy Week and Easter services were shared with our friends from Holy Trinity Episcopal Church and St Cuthbert's RC Church. A memorable performance of the St John Passion filled Melrose Church on Holy Saturday. Christmas was busy with all the usual concerts and school services. There was a full church in Melrose for the Christingle Service on Christmas Eve. Bowden Kirk was packed with all ages on Christmas morning. The World Day of Prayer, the Kirkin' of the Melrosian and Remembrance Sunday also saw the 3 local congregations coming together.

The pandemic changed the way we worship and opened up new possibilities. This remains the legacy. Melrose Services are live-streamed and many join us live or watch the recording later. A weekly podcast based on the service is posted on Facebook, Instagram and our church website and can be listened to on a dedicated phone line.

A monthly service in St John's Care Home was re-started, supported by a number of members of the congregation.

The minister worked alongside St Mary's School as well as the local Cub Scouts to celebrate Remembrance. St Mary's and Melrose Primary School held Christmas services in the church. The minister, as one of the chaplain's to Earlston High School, was involved with Easter and Christmas services in Earlston.

In the course of the year the minister conducted 25 funerals, 3 weddings and 5 baptisms. We gained 2 new members by profession of faith and 5 by certificate of transfer.

- Church life

We are grateful to our church 'staff team' for their contribution to church life and worship throughout the year. It is a great care of Melrose Church and Hall. Karen Armstrong keeps Bowden Kirk clean and tidy. Tracey Glover in the church office does all our bookkeeping and administration. Hall bookings greatly increased in the course of the year as more groups and individuals made use of our premises. Feedback is always very positive. We provide a much-valued community resource that brings many people into the orbit of the church.

A weekly e-mail to 'Bowden and Melrose Church Online' keeps subscribers up to date with all the week's news and information along with a hymn sheet attached for those worshipping from home. A cycle of seasonal magazines keeps the congregation informed and encouraged.

Our Treasurer stepped down once the 2021 accounts were completed. No successor has been forthcoming so the Finance Committee, and particularly the Session Clerk, have covered the duties in the meantime. The annual accounts for 2022 were prepared by David Campbell of Dean's Accountants in Hawick and again for 2023.

- Activities

Bowden Kirk was open to visitors throughout the year and was popular with walkers and tourists alike – an oasis of calm.

The weekly 'Open Door' in Melrose Church Hall on Thursday mornings saw steady growth and was appreciated by congregation, community and visitors. It has become an important 'safe space' for many. The monthly Bowden Café ran throughout the year and was well supported and much appreciated. The support of to cover holidays and Family Services was much appreciated by minister and congregation alike.

The new Presbytery of Lothian and Borders came into existence on 1 January 2023 bringing together the Presbyteries of Lothian, Melrose and Peebles, Duns and Jedburgh. Time will be needed to rationalise the work of the 4 constituent Presbyteries and to get used to being a much bigger entity. The Presbytery Mission Plan was approved in the course of the year.

The St Cuthbert's Way Churches Together Group continued to meet to discuss ways of making the walk more of a pilgrimage and enhancing the experience for walkers. The leaflet encouraging walkers to visit the churches along the way was re-printed. A website and podcasts are also up and running.

The minister along with the weekly Cosy Café for pupils who find lunchtimes hard. They worked alongside the Religious and Moral Studies staff on a number of projects.

- Fund-raising/ support for others

Both the annual Bowden fund-raising coffee morning in February and the Summer Fayre in August were great successes. Money raised went to our Special Projects Fund. Our support for Al-Shurooq School for the Blind in Bethlehem continued.

We've moved away from a door-to-door collection for Christian Aid and encourage online giving with retiring collections during Christian Aid Week. Further donations were made as part of our Harvest Thanksgiving. Many supported the Blythswood Care Shoebox Appeal. Giving to the local Foodbank is promoted each week.

Financial Review

This year's accounts have been drawn up under the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator's (OSCR) guidelines, as instructed by the Church of Scotland. The principal source of income is offerings of £65,280 (2022 £72,641) with our overall unrestricted income being £110,262 (2022 £112,245). Our expenditure totalled £130,991 (2022 £124,365). The underlying income and expenditure levels of the congregation remains under review by the Session.

Investment Policy and Performance

The investment objectives are managed by a professional stockbroker, of Charles Stanley on a discretionary basis, with a view to securing a balance of growth and income but with a medium risk. It is the trustees view that these objectives have been achieved. The portfolio valuation, at the year end, reflects the current global economic position. The portfolio's capital return in 2023 was negative 0.01% which was 5% behind the average benchmark comparators. In the previous year the return was negative 12.74% which was 6% behind the average benchmark comparators. The income yield this year was 3.75% compared to 3.30% in 2022.

Risk Management

The age of the membership of the congregation is increasing, meaning that it may prove difficult to replace trustees in due course. Efforts will continue to be made to interact with the community to address this concern. Maintaining income levels is a challenge and trustees engage directly with the community to set up regular electronic banking donations as opposed to irregular cash donations. The hall is a source of rental income and is a popular venue for a variety of events. The share portfolio is a source of income and capital growth but it is at risk from the vagaries of global financial market events and that is why the fund is managed on a discretionary basis by professional stockbrokers The financial risk is mitigated by regular meetings of the finance committee to consider management accounts and other financial issues.

Reserves Policy

It is the Trustees' policy to hold reserves appropriate to the maintenance of the Churches of Bowden (A Listed) and Melrose (B Listed) and the manse (C Listed and situated in a conservation area). At the year end the Church held unrestricted funds of £423,017 of which £21,177 had been designated for Fabric Fund and £79,979 for the Reserve Fund. The General Fund stands at £232,674 with the designated Investment Fund showing a surplus of £89,187. The charity trustees have considered the reserves required and have taken into account their current and future liabilities. It is the Trustees' policy, based on recent experience, to hold reserves with a view to being in a position to maintain their obligations to the above properties and the unexpected contingencies that may and have arisen in recent years.

The Church also held £19,869 of restricted funds which have been provided for the purposes specified in Note 15.

Structure, Governance and Management

The congregation is a registered charity, number SC006480 and is administered in accordance with the terms of the Deed of Constitution (or Deed of Constitution (Unitary Form)) and is subject to the Acts and Regulations of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland.

Members of the Kirk Session are the charity trustees. The Kirk Session members are the elders of the church and are chosen from those members of the church who are considered to have the appropriate gifts and skills. The minister, who is a member of the Kirk Session, is elected by the congregation and inducted by Presbytery. The Kirk Session meets four times during the year to manage the activities of the charity. At each meeting the agenda always include finance and fabric as main items. The Kirk Session is supported by a consitituted finance committee which met four times in the year, independently of the Kirk Session, and reports to the Kirk Session. The finance committee routinely meets to consider matters relating to the financial management of the Charity's resources, reports from the independent stockbroker dealing with the portfolio performance and expenditure commitments and decision making in line with the Charity's objectives.

- 2. to which, in my opinion, attention should be drawn in order to enable a proper understanding of the accounts to be reached.



Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies, which have been applied consistently in the current and preceding year in dealing with items which are considered material to the accounts, are set out below.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standards applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) issued on 16 July 2014 and revised in October 2019 and the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102), the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended).

Fund accounting

Funds are classified as either restricted funds or unrestricted funds, defined as follows.

Restricted funds are funds subject to specific requirements as to their use which may be declared by the donor or with their authority or created through legal processes, but still within the wider objects of the charity.

Endowment funds are funds which have been given on the condition that the original capital sum is not reduced, but the income there from is used for the purpose defined in accordance with the objects of the charity.

Unrestricted funds are expendable at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the objects of the charity. If parts of the unrestricted funds are earmarked at the discretion of the trustees for a particular purpose, they are designated as a separate fund. This designation has an administrative purpose only and does not legally restrict the trustees' discretion to apply the fund.

Incoming resources

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Donated services and facilities

Donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised as income when the charity has control over the item, any conditions associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use by the charity of the item is probable and that economic benefit can be measured reliably. In accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS102) the general volunteer time of congregation members is not recognised.

On receipt, donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market; a corresponding amount is then recognised as expenditure in the period of receipt.

Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the Bank.

Fixed Assets

The charity has the right to occupy and use for its charitable objects certain tangible fixed assets, including the Church, halls and manse, vested in the Church of Scotland General Trustees. No consideration is payable for the use of these assets. Expenditure incurred on the repair and maintenance of these assets is charged as resources expended in the Statement of Financial Activities in the period in which the liability arises.

All tangible fixed assets costing in excess of £5,000 having a value to the charity greater than one year, other than those acquired for specific purposes, are capitalised. There are no tangible fixed assets

Investments

Fixed asset investments are stated at market value at the balance sheet date. Unrealised gains and losses represent the difference between the market value at the beginning and end of the financial year or, if purchased in the year, the difference between cost and market value at the end of the year. Realised gains and losses represent the difference between the proceeds on disposal and the market value at the start of the year or cost if purchased in the year.

Taxation

Bowden and Melrose Church of Scotland is recognised as a charity for the purposes of applicable taxation legislation and is therefore not subject to taxation on its charitable activities. The charity is not registered for VAT and resources expended therefore include irrecoverable input VAT.

All Church of Scotland congregations contribute to the National Stipend Fund which bears the costs of all ministers' stipends and employer's contributions for national insurance, pension and housing and loan fund. Ministers' stipends are paid in accordance with the national stipend scale, which is related to years of service. For the year under review the minimum stipend was £30,135 and the maximum stipend (in the fifth and subsequent years) £37,032.

8 Trustee Remuneration and Related Party Transactions

During the year 1 trustee received reimbursement of expenses incurred totalling £44.99. The Minister received reimbursement of expenses totalling £6,793.54 including £1,454.55 for travel, £4,337 towards a stove deposit, and £1,001.99 for a third party donation to CCAP Church Project.

Payments were made of £183,42 for the minister's telephone and £3,476.87 for council tax of the manse. Payments were made to the following individuals who are Trustees or connected to Trustees for providing the following services during the year.
